COMPETITIONS

The club sponsors and participates in a variety of competitions for its membership. These competitions provide an opportunity to have others outside of the club view and comment on one's images.

Competitions are held 10 months out of each year with images being submitted at the first meeting of the month starting in May and ending with February. The results of the judging are presented at the first meeting of the month following submission. During the meeting, an outside judge comments on the previous month's entries.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership in the Dallas Camera Club is \$60. annually (by Credit Card or PayPal). The benefits, however, far outweigh the price. For a small fee, members get a year's worth of activities specially tailored to the DCC's objective: the mutual entertainment and education of its members in all forms of amateur photographic art.

If you are a new member, we are here to welcome you with a variety of options to make your photo experience friendly and fun. If you have been a member, this is to remind you of what a rich and rewarding community you have joined!

MEETINGS

This palette extends beyond merely a monthly meeting. In fact, there are two meetings each month. The second Tuesday reviews monthly competition prints with the judge's comments and a display of all the entries. The fourth Tuesday features a wellrecognized speaker and often a video presentation from recent field trips.

TRAINING

These second and fourth meetings are preceded by several concurrent training sessions targeting all skill levels. These include welcome, introduction and orientation to the club; how club competitions work; as well as advanced sessions on a variety of topics including technical camera use, composition, lighting, subject matter, etc. Training is usually conducted by current members willing to share skills and expertise. Some are one class presentations; others are longer, project-oriented classes which may involve "homework". The second and fourth Thursdays are classes conducted on **ZOOM** in conjunction with the Plano Photography Club. Again, members share skills and knowledge on such topics as Photoshop, Lightroom, editing, constructive critique, photo history and more.

All **ZOOM** sessions and many in-person sessions are recorded and any PowerPoint presentations appear on the website for members missing a session or for further review.

FIELD TRIPS

Field trips are both local and destination. The excursions are designed for camaraderie, growth in photography skills, as well as visiting new and/or familiar sites. Members can arrange to carpool. Often group rates are offered (if applicable) and there is always a meal shared. Destination trips are offered once or twice a year and are preceded with advance group planning to ensure a successful experience. Participants are encouraged to submit images from the trips for a meeting slideshow presentation.

ANNUAL BANQUET

The Annual Banquet is an opportunity to meet as a group and celebrate a year's worth of activities and growth in photographic skills.Various awards are presented.

COMPETITIONS

The DCC has three competition levels: Beginner, Advanced and Masters, and members are encouraged to participate. Jurors are drawn from the Photographic Society of America (PPA) or from a pool of local professional photographers who present constructive critiques of entries. Themes alternate by month: Open and Named Theme.

There are often local gallery exhibits featuring club member images, for those interested in participating.

WEBSITE

The DCC website is the "go-to" place for updated information on all topics and subjects related to the club. It also offers a few "members-only-bypassword" information and training.

In addition, there are hidden gems on the website: officer information, club history as well as a "who ya gonna call" resource list for help and information.

NEWSLETTER

A monthly Newsletter, Thru the Lens (TTL) is posted on the club website. The Newsletter has a variety of articles, announcements and member stories and photos.

Contemporary Photographs and the Transformative Power of Color




My photographic works are an open invitation for contemplative reflection. The body of work I will be sharing has the unifying quality of being contemporary and rich in color, geometrics and textures. As a photographic artist, I am drawn to patterns in nature and our manmade world. I truly believe in the transformative power of color. I believe in the importance of incorporating art in interiors. Where there is no window, the illusion of space needs to be created for the sake of the soul. Life has afforded me peeks into many cultures and a myriad of experiences. I come to you as a photographic artist, a biochemist, a nature lover, a gardener. I am a daughter, a spouse, a sister and a mother. I will share my photographic lens with YOU and we will travel to Dallas, Amsterdam, Reykjavik, Montreal, Kyoto, New Delhi, Berlin, Milan and Buenos Aires.

A Focus to Live by: My approach to photography involves the routine practice to seek the extraordinary where-ever I may be. This practice of **seek and you shall find**, yields rewards in the form of significant photographs as well as it grants me a rich, meditative mindset. It is an immersive routine a ritual of observation, that even without a camera in tow I practice to develop the eye, the focus. I truly believe that all around us, exist wonderful installations waiting to be collected and curated. In my life and with my photography, I cultivate the habit to be curious, to be receptive, to not be dull to the wonder around us. I am an observer of people and the environment in which we live. Faces, nature's designs, color, texture all intrigue me. It is my intent as a photographer to capture the essence, the wonder, and the soul of a subject, whether person, place, or thing, and freeze that moment for all to experience.

I approach art with a cosmopolitan perspective: I was born in Cali, Colombia and grew up in New York City grounded by a very close-knit Catholic family that valued education and exposed me to a myriad of cultures and art forms. Shortly after our family's immigration to the USA, we lost our father to a heart attack- I was the youngest of six. With intelligent resourcefulness, our mother guided us past these sad times by making ample use of the wealth of cultural offerings found in New York City. Art and photography have always been a part of my family life either as subject or behind the lens; Growing up, in our makeshift bedroom darkroom, my sister, brother and I developed our B&W photography.

My body of work has evolved from B&W photography, digital photography, professional portraiture and my formal education in the sciences: I am a graduate from the School of Arts & Sciences, Cornell University - I majored in biochemistry. After working various years in cancer pharmacology research at Southwestern Medical School, I changed direction to devote time to family and portraiture photography. The practice of experimentation and observation has carried through to my photography.

Elevating Your Art: How to bring more depth, form, and emotion to your images.

Description:

We know how to compose an image, but how do we raise our photography above producing well-arranged, 2-dimensional representations? How do we express our vision? It doesn't matter if you're a landscape photographer a portraitist, a bird photographer, an architectural photographer, or you live for bugs on flowers, this conversation is designed to discuss elements we can bring to any of those disciplines to elevate our photos and communicate our vision.





Biography: (the I-really-love-me version)

Ian McVea is a British/Irish-born photojournalist and photography educator. His passion for photography started as a 9-year-old with his mum's Olympus Pen F half-frame camera, and in 9th grade, at boarding school in Ethiopia, he discovered a life-long love for the darkroom. While attending college in San Diego and Arlington, TX, he worked as a custom black-and-white printer. On graduating from UT Arlington with a degree in Management, Ian joined the *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* as a staff photographer, later becoming a photo editor and then Director of Photography. During his 23+ years at the *Star-Telegram*, Ian covered news, features, and sports. Sports photography was not his forte, but he covered the Stars, the Cowboys, and shot a dizzying number of Friday night football games.

He covered the OKC bombing, the Shuttle Columbia disaster, and Hurricanes Katrina and Rita for international wire services.

While on staff at the *Star-Telegram*, Ian taught photojournalism classes as an adjunct professor at TCU's Schieffer School of Journalism, and on leaving the paper in 2012 he began teaching Commercial Photography full time in the Arlington ISD. He also teaches summer workshop for photography instructors.

lan's images have been published by *Getty Images*, the *AP*, *Reuters*, *New York Times*, *LIFE*, *Time*, *Newsweek*, *Sports Illustrated*, and then there's a *National Examiner* cover he'd rather not discuss. His work has been part of recent exhibits at a number of Texas galleries and art museums, and have received honours from the *Dallas Press Club*, *National Headliners*, *Houston Press Club*, *The Texas APME*, and the *Texas Photographic Society*, among others.

He is an active member of the *Royal Photographic Society*, the *Texas Photographic Society*, the *National Press Photographers Association*, *American Society of Media Photographers*, and the *Association of Texas Photography Instructors*.

He shoots mostly analogue medium-format and 4x5 cameras. Digitally, Ian is a Nikon Z mirrorless user, but firmly believes that Canon and Sony cameras can lead very productive lives.

Ian has two married daughters who share his passion for analogue photography.



Additional information will be coming including directions to parking area, information, and menu for restaurant, how to avoid chiggers, use of photos, liability release...



Background


<u>Clymer Meadow Preserve</u> is located northeast of Dallas and contains some of the largest and most diverse remnants of Blackland Prairie. This is Texas' version of the tallgrass prairie that once stretched from near the Texas coast to Manitoba. This rare 1,475-acre "island" of natural history is part of a larger conservation area that includes land owned by The Nature Conservancy (TNC) and other private owners. See map.

It is about 60 miles, a 1-hour drive, from North Dallas. See attached map. The Clymer Meadow Preserve is not regularly open to the public. Though there are many things to see in our prairies, the most photogenic time in the Spring is mid-April – June when the spring colors are peaking. The Nature Conservancy will provide our guide who will take us to good photo sites, keep us out of trouble and be able to answer questions. We will park at the gate near the area where we will be photographing and enter as a group with the guide at 5pm. The parking area is limited, and it is suggested that you carpool. Chiggers can be a problem. See Sean's resource materials for some tips on protecting yourself. Clymer Meadow manager will provide additional information as well.

FIELD TRIPS

WICHITA WILDLIFE REFUGE A Review April 13 - 16, 2023

The Wichita Mountains National Wildlife Refuge is just a relatively short drive north in Oklahoma near Lawton and Ft. Sill. Mary and I arrived early Thursday afternoon in <u>Medicine Park</u>, our office headquarters for this field trip. The refuge is just a few miles to the west so after lunch, we drove in and started looking for babies. Springtime is always a treat on the refuge because of the young animals and wildflowers. This time we got a big shock. Refuge managers are using controlled burns to manage this remnant short grass prairie habitat in a more natural manner and the recently burned areas were unexpected. While parts of the blackened landscape looked bad, a close inspection revealed fresh green sprouts of grass shooting up all over and bison grazing contentedly.

We had a group dinner scheduled for Friday evening at the <u>Old Plantation</u> <u>Restaurant</u> and 18 of us were there. Unfortunately, I had screwed up (sorry about that) and we were not seated at the advertised time. A few folks wandered off searching for other options, but it all worked out in the end, and everyone had a good time. After dinner we were treated to the sights and sounds of military training exercises coming from nearby Ft. Sill. Flares lit up the night sky while explosions rumbled through the hills. During the day, there were fighter jets screaming around overhead making practice bombing runs. Not sounds one expects in a wildlife refuge!

Saturday the wind really kicked up and made being out of doors somewhat unpleasant. The group convened at Meer's for a good time lunch featuring some of the largest sandwiches you have ever seen.

The highlight of any spring trip to the refuge is seeing baby bison, longhorns, and prairie dogs. This time only the longhorn calves were plentiful and easily photographed. We did see a few little red bison calves, but good photo opts were scarce. There were young prairie dogs in the fields near the Holy City, but the very best viewing was in <u>Lawton at Elmer Thomas Park</u>. Another favorite capture was the brightly colored Collared Lizards out basking on the granite boulders.



FIELD TRIPS

WICHITA WILDLIFE REFUGE

A Review April 13 - 16, 2023

A Travel Journal By

The Dallas Camera Club's May 2023 field trip was to the Wichita Wildlife Refuge not far over the border from Texas into Oklahoma, about a 3 hour drive over 4 lane, divided highways. Some of the photographers arrived on Thursday; others on Friday. Many stayed in the <u>Plantation Inn</u> in <u>Medicine Park</u> just outside of the eastern edge of the refuge; some camped and others stayed in Lawton, Oklahoma.

Jay Hoppenstein and Hal Sommer drove through Lawton and visited an in-town park known for its prairie dogs. Not one did we see!

Ft. Sill, an artillery, active military base is just south of the refuge. We toured the base and visited the excellent museum, just outside of which was an area about the size of 4 football fields which contained a multitude of military field guns, huge mechanical weapons and small tanks. Not until I stood beside the guns could I appreciate the magnitude of these weapon systems.


We drove into the center of the refuge to the information center where we obtained a map of the entire refuge. The ranger indicated on the map, using circles and arrows, where various wildlife could be seen, especially in the early morning or late in the afternoon. We decided to make a limited exploration of the property to familiarize ourselves with the locations the ranger indicated on the map. We had expectations of seeing bison and their calves, prairie dogs and elk.

Our first drive through did find a small group of bison grazing not far from the information center and a small pond. We photographed them with our cell phone cameras and sped on to another designated site on the map, covering about ¼ of the refuge.

As the afternoon waned and we sped to Medicine Park to get to our reserved room and be ready to join the other DCC members for the planned dinner together Friday evening at the Plantation Inn's dining room.

The Plantation Inn did not honor the reservation for our group that Larry Petterborg had made. Several of us found another restaurant a few minutes walking distance away. We were seated immediately and after ordering, enjoyed a delightful meal on the patio. The soft sounds of the artillery from Ft. Sill boomed like a rock band's base drum through our dinner.

Our accommodations at the <u>Plantation Inn</u> was neat, clean and basic. We arose early and went out to get a bite of breakfast or a cup of coffee before 0800; however, nothing was open except one small place that catered to the refuge's trail-hikers. After a quick refreshment we drove westward through the park hoping to drive to the top of Scott's mountain. Unfortunately, the road was closed.



FIELD TRIPS

Undaunted, we drove into the central area of the refuge using our previous day's exploration as a guide along with the annotated map. There our quest for bison was fulfilled. We found several small groups grazing in clusters of 4-5 about 50 to 100 yards from the road. We saw no calves. Occasionally, a bison would walk across the road just in front of the car. Though they appeared docile, we respected their space and photographed them with our 500 – 600 mm lenses. My camera was set at 1/1000 of a second and mounted on a sturdy tripod.

Saturday was very windy. The wind buffeted our cameras mounted tripods requiring a hand to hold the tripod from falling while making an exposure.

Free ranging wild bison was one of the attractions that lured us to the refuge; however, after seeing them standing and grazing for over half an hour, we were eager to find other wildlife. Longhorn cattle, some with calves, were prevalent and presented themselves as another subject. Still, after awhile we were restless for other animals.

Saturday and Sunday we drove every trial on the map. We could not find any prairie dogs or elk. We did visit over a dozen ponds and lakes, some quite large, which gave us an opportunity to photograph the refuge's landscape. I often took 3 images focused at different distances from where the camera was for future focus stacking in Photoshop.

On our way back to Medicine Park we discovered that the Scott Mountain road was open. The long drive up a moderate grade brought us to the top and provided a 360° view of the area. There were many hikers walking up the mountain road! The wind was blowing over 30 mph at the top and required a person to lean into the wind while walking. Care had to be taken when getting into a vehicle as the wind would slam the door with enough force to injure any extremity not inside the vehicle.

The village of Medicine Park was crowded with tourists, many on motorcycles, especially Harleys. There were a few restaurants, though they all closed at 7:00 PM sharp, lots of clothing, T shirt, curio shops and several bars featuring live music. The village is on the edge of a quiet stream that must be crossed-over on an old metal bridge which vibrated when cars or even pedestrians use it.

One of the joys of DCC field trips was meeting others of the group "on the roads" and exchanging information and sightings. Additionally, we had a grand time dining together for lunch on Saturday with everyone at <u>Meers Restaurant</u>, just at the northern border of the refuge.

Sunday morning we made our last pass through the refuge looking for elk. We were able to capture a few more bison images but no elk before heading back to Dallas.

It will be fascinating to see the collected images of everyone at a future DCC AV Field Trip production from the Wichita Wildlife Refuge. There will be a learning experience to discover how individual photographers captured the weekend's wildlife and scenery.



With five grandchildren, all of whom have been involved with sports for most of their lives, I have become adept at sports and action photography and a little bit of portraiture.


