

I have been asked to remember Susan as a friend. I am sharing her story with you, so you can know her as a woman first and an artist/photographer secondly.

Long ago, I realized the truth in the old saying, "Friends come into your life for a reason, a season, or a lifetime". Susan came into my life for too short a season. She has lifetime friends who could write this with much more authority. However, sometimes new friends also have new reasons to form lasting bonds and I was so lucky to have been in this place so Susan and I could do just that.

Susan and I are new friends. We met here at the Camera Club. I was a true novice. Susan was a star, the ultimate insider. She was beautiful, intimidating, and her photographs were stunning. She and her husband, Hugh, were held in high esteem in the club.

Then Hugh died. They had been married 33 years and Susan had so much admiration for his photography that she often could not see her own talent. Yes, he encouraged and nurtured her talents. Yes, they traveled widely and since both were expert photographers, they would push the other to "get THE shot." But even now, Susan would be surprised when her amazing prints won awards and received recognition.

When I was asked to write this eulogy, I immediately pulled a book from my bookshelf,

"Friendship Blooms in the Loveliest Places". The Dallas Camera Club was the lovely place where my friendship with Susan bloomed.

We had become casual friends when the opportunity to go to Kenya with the club presented itself. We both needed someone with whom to share a room. Susan admitted later that she did some research before committing to share a room with a woman she did not know well on such an adventurous trip. I will forever be grateful to those of you who gave me a vote of confidence. Susan and I had too much fun. We turned out to be quite compatible - no fussing about who got which bed, or where our makeup should be placed in the bathroom, or who talked too much or too little! Really, it was easy breezy! And she helped plan and deliver a most wonderful surprise - a truly African birthday party for me.

We could share a room comfortably in Africa because she could remove her hearing aids and never complain if I snored. We had both lived through long marriages and also long periods of being single. We had full grown children that we loved. We spoke the same emotional language common of women our age with roots from small town, but career successes in the big city.

Over the past year, we would talk frequently, often sharing computer and Lightroom agonies. I watched and learned as much as I could from looking at her images and we would share ideas about good shots as we traveled. At home, Susan loved to cook and garden. And, she did love her FLOWERS! She shared those talents generously.

Time and life also inevitably bring difficult situations into our lives - deaths, family issues, financial desires not met, personal ambitions thwarted, personal illnesses - all come to us - but friends, even new friends, just know and they guard our most personal secrets and loan ears for listening and hands to hold. Susan and I had become those kind of friends, in just a couple of years.

We thought we had many years to help one another navigate the indignity of growing old. Sadly for me, and for many of you, this was not to be. Today, it is my solemn duty and loving honor to say good-by to my beautiful friend, Susan Kindley, who left me way too soon. I miss her terribly.

March storms in Texas are not always the most inviting times to venture out with camera gear. Certainly, the most adventurous of us precariously move our trash bins to the curb and scan the horizon for menacing clouds, but most of us are waiting for those three perfect 60-70 days when the tiny buds and leaves forecasting spring invite us out with macro lenses and landscape gear.

So, these days are perfect for another activity that will come all too soon. Be forewarned. The DCC May 14th meeting features the annual Potpourri Night: Member's Slideshows. These should be 5-minute [not a second more] glimpses of your work with a musical background.

Often, these seem to be a challenge both in subject matter and construction. To help with the nuts and bolts of creating a slideshow, we can look to our very own DCC Archives, posted under *Training and Education* on the DCC website.

Now that you are armed with the "how to" portion of this project, the "with what" is a bit more difficult. An excellent way to start is to look at your "bucket" of photos, either in Lightroom or your organization method of choice. Can you find a theme? Look back – pick a time frame – what occurred? What was your response? Did you capture an event? A subject? Location? Time period? What happened in 2005? 2021? 2023? Can/do your photos reflect that reality? In what way? Can you pick an emotion or response? Search for a thread - Did your technique (color, b/w, lens, stance, etc.) match what you felt? A certain light/shadows, style (macro, documentary); seasons, wildlife, celebrations...? Did the same subject appear again and again? Are you partial to a subject, place, lens, and editing style? Unknowingly, you are gaining insight and revealing yourself! So in preparation for creating your slideshow, sift through your images and select 25-50 that tell a story you would like to share with your photo peers. It is such an inspiring evening to see what others are doing. Polish your skills and begin preparing your slideshow.



Past Field Trip: White Sands National Park, April 11-13, 2024 DCC members in Alamogordo, New Mexico to photograph otherworldly landscapes

April Field Trip Report: White Sands National Park, NM



The morning after the 2024 DCC Awards Banquet a small contingent of 12 hearty souls headed west to Alamogordo, NM. At over 4000 ft. elevation and very low humidity, Alamogordo is a radical departure from north Texas. We were there for the bright dunes in White Sands National Park, ancient petroglyphs at Three Rivers Petroglyphs Park, blooming cactus around Oliver Lee State Park, and more Italian food. This was a very eventful trip with several of us having tire issues and/ forgotten cameras and computers. At least one camera was dropped but fortunately undamaged.

The weather was at times, hot and windy but the photography was spectacular with stunning scenery and magnificent sunsets. While wildlife photography was not a significant part of the trip we did see a herd of Oryx, a few lizards, lots of beetles, and many different bird species. It was a long drive from Dallas but well worth the time spent getting to and from such an amazing location.





Three single photos showing full eclipse and solar prominences. Basic settings were F9 and ISO 200. Two of the photos were taken at shutter speed of 320 giving best view of solar prominences showing dramatic changes between 30 sec and 2 min 39 sec into full eclipse. The 3rd photo was shot at shutter speed of 5 sec and is focused on the details of solar corona but one major prominence is still visible at bottom.







These next three photos show details of corona over larger area of the sky. These are stacks of 11 to 13 photos with shutter speeds from 1/3200 to 0.4 secs. All photos were taken in brackets of 9 with 0.7 stops between shots. Base shutter speeds were 1/500, 1/250, 1/125, 1/60, 1/30, 1/15, 1/30, 1/60, 1/125, 1/250, 1/250 taken over time of about <3 mins.

This is a video / sequence of 8 photos taken at shutter speed of 1/320 highlighting changes in solar prominences from about 30 sec to 2 min 39 sec. Particularly interesting was prominence that formed like a whip near center right edge and bright triangular prominence that formed at bottom. Both are clearly visible on on photo 3 at 2 min 39 sec but are barely noticeable on photo 2 at about 30 sec.

Basic processing was to batch load sequences (shuttered speed) into Photoshop, center and crop, do simple editing in acr, and convert to smart object. Then select: Images/ Smart Objects,/Batch mode/ Mean. After rasterizing the layer, create copy for application of radial blur. Using the copy, select: Filter/Blur/Radial, to create blurred copy. Combine blurred copy with original by selecting: Image/ Calculations to create the filter as new document. Select new document, copy and paste into original. Deleted blurred copy. You can also try doing the blur on the original files in Photoshop and then create stacked mean file.



The J.J. Spurlock Award for Creative Portraiture (Print)

Portraits of people are to be entered in this contest. Photographs are judged on the creative use of photo processing, whether manipulated in the chemical darkroom or by the use of digital processing software. These creative portraits should depart from reality and be noticeably different from the scene as originally viewed through the camera lens. All phases of the photographic process, i.e. the original capture of the image and the creative processing, must be the original work of the photographer. Entries are either monochrome or color prints.

Dr. James J. Spurlock used creative darkroom techniques for his monochrome portraits which earned him local and international recognition. The competition includes both monochrome and color prints at the request of Mrs. Spurlock. He was a University of North Texas Administrator and Chemistry Professor and a long time member and past president of The Dallas Camera Club. The award was created in 1994.


Cell Phone Camera Competition Award (Projected)

Dallas Camera Club (DCC) was organized in 1934 by 52 printmakers meeting twice a month to improve their photographic skills. Color slides were added, presumably in the 1940s, and color print competitions were added in 1970. In 1998, images from digital files were first accepted into DCC competitions. In 2005, slides were combined with projected digital images to create the projected images category. Slides were eliminated in 2008. Club competitions are now focused on color prints, monochrome prints and digital projected images.

The objective of the club is "the mutual entertainment and education of its members in all forms of amateur photographic art." The DCC hosts contests and events including monthly competitions, field trips, workshops, programs of general interest, an awards banquet and an annual competition (the "Bird") between DCC and Fort Worth Camera Club members. The DCC emphasizes intra-club competition as a learning process. Importance is placed on helping the beginner or new member feel at ease, ask questions, learn and participate.

From the 1934-1984 50th Anniversary Yearbook

The Annual Awards Banquet goes back to at least 1962 when it was held at the Baker Hotel for a cost of \$3.00 (the club paid the first \$2.00). The banquet is held the first meeting in April. Awards are given for the best prints and projected images from the year's monthly competitions. Awards are also given to the members who earned the highest total points in each class and category during the club year. Other awards, as described in the Special Annual Competitions and Two Special Honors sections that follow, and installation of new officers complete this social event.

In 1988, we were in high cotton and the banquet was held at Royal Oaks Country Club costing \$14.25 per person with a cash bar. (Editor's note – What happened to the cash bar?) Banquets have been held at a variety of venues before and after including Holiday Inn Central, El Chico, Melrose Hotel, Wyatt's Cafeteria. Harvey Hotel, and the Riverlake, Spring Valley, Royal Oaks and Gleneagles Country Clubs - to name a few. Prices have ranged from \$3 to \$35 per person.
