

Mastering Photoshop
Layer
Juergen Gulbins, author
Publisher: Rocky Nook

Mastering Photoshop layers by Juergen Gulbins caught my attention the moment I saw it advertised. I personally have a couple manuals on Photoshop and Photoshop Elements. Even though this book is written for Photoshop CS6 and Photoshop CC (Creative Cloud) users the author refers to the function ability in other versions when necessary.

Many of Photoshop's layers functions remain unchanged from earlier versions. Mastering Photoshop Layers is also of great value to Photoshop Element users.

This comprehensive 294 page book contains a nice blend of technical and practical instruction for the person who has a working knowledge of Photoshop.

Juergen has expertly written a book that is a must read for the novice and advanced Photoshop user. The novice user can start with the first chapter to learn the basics of using layers and the long-time user who wants a refresher course on layers.


Layers is the foundation for working in Photoshop for editing individual areas of your image nondestructively to ensure your end result will be a combination of all of the best parts of your image. There are clear step-by-step instructions with excellent illustrations to assist you to quickly master the tools. No matter what your knowledge level, this is a very valuable resource. You can skip parts of the text that describe techniques with which you are familiar and take more time on those that you want to learn. At times this book reminds me of a textbook with the technical detail but it always provides a hands-on example during the course or at the end of the chapter. Speaking of "hands-on" you are provided on page 10 of the text the website where you can download most of the images used in the book. That raises the value of this book. Sprinkled throughout the book are appropriate keyboard short cuts and program settings.

I appreciate the way the pages in the book are laid out. There is a side bar next to the text that has a screen shot of the Photoshop tools that help the more visual learner like me make sure I know what is being described in the text.

Enjoy the clear step-by-step instructions for all you wanted to know about Photoshop Layers and were afraid to ask.

Exposed - Replacing a Background Concept

Photoshop Background Replacement - An Insight

One of the most beloved capabilities of Photoshop is the ability to replace a background behind the image's foreground subject. Often it is simply the sky; other times, it may be anything that the imagination and creative conception of the editor conjures up. There are many techniques to accomplish this and the following is just one of them.

The process requires that the image editor use any one or a combination of the several selection tools within Photoshop to select either the background or the foreground. If the foreground subject were to be selected, then by "inverting" the selection (Ctrl I on a PC), the background becomes the selection.

Load the foreground and background images into Photoshop as individual

layers. (Figure 1) Place the intended new background layer <u>below</u> the original image so that when a **layer mask** of the original image's background is applied (with its selection already made), the background becomes invisible and the new background almost magically becomes visible.

The layer mask covers up the non-selected area (Figure 3) which can be visually confirmed by observing the layer mask icon beside the visible image on the same layer. The black area is "concealing" what it covers (by virtue of the previous selection made) as a mask – thus the name, layer mask.

It is important to realize that when a selection is created in a layer (Figure 2) and a layer mask is applied to that layer, the selection remains visible and everything not selected is "covered" by the mask and is hidden. In this example the sky is easiest to select using the Magic Wand, the Tragic Wand as some say.

But, in this instance, it is the background sky which needs to be masked. Pressing CTRL I (on a PC) inverts the selection which results in the background being masked while the foreground remains visible. Figure 4

This permits the layer beneath the masked foreground layer to become visible in the area (the sky in this example) to become visible. The Move Tool can be used to arrange the new background layer for best effect. The new background can be moved, stretched and manipulated independently of the foreground for the best effect using the Move or Transform Tools.

(Continued from page 6) Exposed from the drop down menu, "On Layers" from the several offered options. This permits a realistic observation of the condition of the edges of the foreground as it interfaces with the new background layer. Check the Decontaminate Colors box which will remove most, if not all of the halos around the sub-

Nothing more may be needed.



If required, the selected edges of the foreground image can be refined by the use of the Select and Mask Photoshop tool (above the editing window). (Figure 5) In the View Mode at the top of the window, select the view If necessary the Refine Brush Edge Tool on the top left side of the editing window can help further refine the edges and remove halos. (Figure 6)

Output the processed Refine Edge to New Layer with Layer Mask.






July Field Trip - Mesquite Rodeo - July 14

MESQUITE CHAMPIONSHIP RODEO SATURDAY, JULY 14, 2018

This month's DCC field trip is to the Mesquite Championship Rodeo in Mesquite, Texas on July 14. This is a traditional rodeo held in an air conditioned indoor arena and features bull riding, bronco riding, calf roping, barrel racing, steer wrestling, rodeo clowns and all the usual trappings. We have reserved a block of seats near the chutes. The Reserved seats are just high enough to photograph over the railings about 5 rows up, and the VIP seats are in the first three rows next to the railing. We will also be able to get on the viewing platform above the chutes. The indoor lighting is adequate for photography but not great. I recommend a medium telephoto lens, and a camera that can be used at a high ISO. Flash is not totally prohibited but is not appreciated. The gates open at 6:30pm, and the rodeo starts at 7:30pm. The group rate for Reserved seats is \$20 for seniors age 60+, \$24 for other adults and \$10 for kids 12 and under. The VIP seats are \$27, \$32 and \$20 respectively. Food and drink is available inside, including an all you can eat BB-Q Buffet. To include the BB-Q Buffet, add \$20 to adult tickets and \$10 to kids. All of July and early August: Mt. Rainier (wildflower peak=August 9-13)

July 4 at Dallas Heritage Village

Weeks 2 and 3: Katmai, Alaska—fish jumping into bears' mouths.

(peak = July 19, +/-7days): Colorado wildflowers: Yankee Boy Basin (near Ouray), the Crested Butte area and the top of Mt. Evans, west of Denver.

July & early Aug.: Rocky Mountain National Park—Take the Trail Ridge Road—replete with alpine wildflowers, marmots, bighorn sheep, pica, and elk, too.

July 15-24 or July 30-August 5 (workshop): Glacier Nat'l Parks: peak of wildflowers.
