The Picture and Grow your Know, a journalism curriculum in schools across the county.





September Guest Speaker - Chris Rusanowsky

Chris Rusanowsky is an American photojournalist and documentary photographer based in North Texas. Chris has spent the last twelve years of his career focusing on stories of resilience and American identity. In 2017, Chris signed on to his first News Wire Image Agency, ZUMA Press, as a contract photographer gathering images and breaking news stories. In 2022, Chris and ten founding members created a photojournalist collective named ARGO; this collective made its mission focus on long-term and national stories. His work has been published in Newsweek, The Guardian, Dallas Morning News, Mother Jones, The Wall Street Journal, etc.

With fewer opportunities for staff positions, Chris works tirelessly to produce and capture photo essays around America, working as a contract photographer for commercial clients and raising his one-year-old son. His Cameras have taken him to the rural lands of North Dakota, to documenting young



men in the oil fields, to the disasters of ture, and industry. Chris's passion for the California wildfires, to documenting stories of poverty and reliance in the Philippines, and to the homes and businesses of Americans. Chris's goal is to create photojournalistic essays that convey a message to viewers while honestly capturing people, cul-

photography and storytelling is seen every day. Not a moment goes by where Chris is not looking for a picture or researching his next story. His family and friends supportive community push him never to give up and always to face fear head-on. Since moving back to Texas's birth state, Chris focuses more on his backyard and stories that show America today.

Roller Derby August Field Trip - 2022



Hal Sommer and I arrived at 6:30 at the NYTEX Sports Centre in Richland Hills, an elaborate facility which had 2 ice hockey rinks and 1 roller derby rink. The 1st 1.5 hours were spent shooting "junior" derby gals, some quite young, participating in a game. The rules, as chaotic as they are, were different from the adult contests that followed the juniors.

The arena is a flat oval the size of a hockey arena. The center of the oval is occupied by some striped shirted officials and other folks whose responsibilities were a mystery.

All of the initial action began on the

opposite side of the oval from the bleaches so that those standing in the center blocked the view of the athletes who clustered around into a tight group trying to prevent one of them from escaping and circling the oval. What a strange way to conduct a contest. The start should have been on the bleacher's side where this struggle could be

seen.



brought a folding chair, placed it adjacent to the arena at about the "10-yard line" (in football stadium lingo) on the bleachers side of the arena beneath the ceiling lights that shown more brightly on "my" side of the arena. The lighting was not great but better than the Mesquite Rodeo we "shot" last month. I used my tripod; other DCC photographers handheld his or her cameras or used monopods, some sitting on the floor near the edges of the arena in the "end zone" or in the bleachers. Some DCC photographers walked around the arena but my corner gave a good view of the oval's turn at the opposite end of the oval and the long lane coming toward my position.

Using my zoom, 18-200 mm lens, it was easy to capture all of the skating action

coming toward me. As the skater(s) got closer, I zoomed out, still holding my back-focusing button to keep the subject in focus, and caught them turning right in front of me. I ended up getting lots of "butt" shots as they headed for the last turn toward the opposite side from whence they started.

It was a bit tricky to set the tripod up so that as I panned, the camera stayed level, mostly.

The camera that I used was a 14 year-old Nikon D90, the ISO of which could be forced to a maximum of 6400 (not at all high by today's camera capabilities), which allowed me to manually set the shutter speed to 1/500 of a second, continuous mode, and the f stop to its lowest - f 4. The images appeared to be at least 1 stop too dark when viewed on the camera's backscreen (and later at home after downloading them on my desktop computer).

After importing all of the derby images into Lightroom (LR), I deleted about 50





of the worst in my first pass at editing. In the next pass through the remaining group, I deleted another larger number leaving me with about 200 images. I then went back into the source directory and brought all of the survivors directly into DeNoise (DN), not through LR.

It took DN about 45 seconds/image to process the heavily, noisy images that resulted from shooting at a high ISO. Two and a half hours later, I came back to find all of the DN processed images were saved to a designated directory as dng files. These were reimported into LR where the actual editing could be begun. I then removed from LR the original imported images of the Derby and the original RAW (NEF - Nikon) files leaving me with the DN dng processed images.

DeNoise is a remarkable program used the way described above, much better than using DN as a plug-in within LR. (This I learned from Dennis Fritsche at one of his online DCC training sessions.) Virtually, all of the noise was removed and the images were quite sharp, something not assessable by looking at the LCD screen on the camera's back just after taking a picture.

I had lots of worthwhile images and selected 10 of them that I sent to Frank Richards who will amass all of the DCC photographers' pictures and create a show to be seen in September.

Jeremy Woodhouse - Future Guest Speaker

Having been "grounded" by the pandemic, I spent the better part of 2020 working on small money-generating projects from home which included a series of books, some of my own photography, and others including the photography of friends and clients.

Towards the end of 2020 I was itching to get out so I began doing small group tours to locations such as Oregon and the deserts of the southwest. As I look back on 2021, I completed a tour during each month, albeit not my usual overseas trips to exotic locations, but to places closer to home such as right here in Texas, the Palouse in eastern Washington, or, more recently, places across the border in Mexico. As long as I was keeping my mind occupied and the shutter clicking, I was able to tolerate the pandemic-imposed austerity



that many of us in the travel/ photography business have endured over the past 21 months.

The images that you will see the night of my presentation were all created

between March 2020 and Nov 2021

Jeremy Woodhouse's photography autobiography.

Leaving my graphic design job in 1999, I became a full time outdoor, travel and lifestyle photographer. I have visited 100 countries around the globe and have no plans to stop exploring. Since 2005 I have led dozens of trips all over the world, and I am just as comfortable photographing Naga Sadhus at a Hindu festival as I am photographing puffins on the edge of a cliff in Iceland. I am known for my boundless energy and enthusiasm.

Working together with some of the best guides and tour operators in the industry, my goal is always to try and

be in the right place at the right time—unless something else crops up in between. I have a loyal following with some clients having taken more than 25 tours with me over the years.

When it comes to photography, I consider myself to be a Jack-of-all-Trades—wildlife, landscape, travel, life-style—more recently I have become very proficient at photographing portraits of people around the world.

Back in the day I was the winner of the "Wild Places" Award in the BG Wildlife Photographer of the Year Award in 2000 with my image Lightning over 12 Apostles, and in 2002 I was the Nature's Best Magazine Competition "Grand Prize Winner" for my image of Fly Geyser, both photographed with a Fuji GX 617 Panoramic film camera.

In 2016 I was the Winner of the TPOTY



Best Single Image in a Portfolio titled Mankind, and another image was Highly Commended in the One Shot Shaped by Light.








Image of the Month


