Presidents Message for January

January 2025 President's Message - Dennis Fritsche

Competitions (or Looking for Acceptance in All the Wrong Places):

I compete in monthly competitions at the Dallas Camera Club and the Plano Photography Club. I also submit to outside galleries sponsoring periodic competitions and I will enter a random contest if the theme catches my fancy. I have done well over the years in club competitions but have also done middling

to poorly. In club competitions we know all levels have excellent photographers, any one of which could be at the top of the heap depending on just a few points here and there.

Since 2005 I have submitted annually to the Black and White Magazine Single Image contest. I am proud that I have been represented in 15 of the 19 contests I have entered. I have also been in three issues of their portfolio contest and two issues of the cell phone contest. But I have also had long stretches of not being accepted. PhotoPlace Gallery in Middlebury, Vermont offers a monthly contest on various subjects juried by well-known photographers and gallery directors. Some I enter and some I don't. But I enter very often and face disappointment most of the time. Some winners are chosen for the live exhibit and some for the on-line exhibition. Juried Photo Exhibits | PhotoPlace Gallery

Another such opportunity is the Southeast Center for Photography in Greenville, South Carolina. Photography Classes and More | The SE Center for Photography

All of these have an entry fee and offer no money for winning. So obviously, I'm not doing it for the money, so why do I pay the fees and face disappointment? The answer is the same for club competitions.

Self-improvement and learning: Putting my work out to be judged allows me to compare my effort to others and in some cases receive a judge's feedback. If I am not accepted into a contest, I compare what I submitted to those that were accepted to try to see what the judge valued and where I can improve.

Sense of Accomplishment: It does feel good to be recognized with a good score or an acceptance. The galleries I compete at have catalogs of the contests. It feels good to have a book or magazine with my photograph included.

Supporting the Photography Community: Dallas used to have three outstanding photography galleries. Only one remains as a brick-and-mortar gallery. The Dallas Center for Photography was forced to shut down. I see my entry fees as a way to support the galleries and magazines, have fun, and gain occasional recognition.

This may not be for you, but I urge you to consider giving it a try. What's the worse that could happen?

Footnote: Read the prospectus carefully. Some unscrupulous contests take ownership of your images. Look for those that explicitly say you retain the copyright.


Past Field Trip: John Bunker Sands Wetland Center - December 14, 2024 Members visited a wetlands center for wildlife and landscape photography

Essay on my Travels in 3rd World Countries

This story is an essay on my travels in 3rd World countries. I have always had a passion for traveling and recording the events either with photography or video or both. In addition to the photos and text in this newsletter, I have a LINK below to a video that tells this story with dialogue, more photos, and many video clips. When I was a kid, my traveling was mainly in my imagination and my dreams since I came from a family of modest means. The first time I left the state, I was 18 years old. Then, I began to travel the states and recorded major things and monuments including the Statue of Liberty, Mayflower, Grand Canyon, Golden Gate Bridge, Hoover Dam, and Bourbon Street. I ventured into Mexico to see the Temple of the Sun and the Moon of the Aztec civilization near Mexico City and the Mayan temples in the Yucatan Peninsula.

But then, I put my passion for visiting the world on hold while I pursued life's endeavors like marriage, raising kids, making money, having a career. But finally in the 90s with kids in college, I got back to traveling.

My first trip outside the U.S. and Mexico was a bus tour through most of Western Europe. By 2005, I was making at least two major trips a year. My favorite places to visit were third world countries because these are places where you learn more about how civilizations started, how civilizations relate to each other now, and, possibly, where they are going in the future.

Peru, for example, was the center of the great Inca Empire in the 16th century. At the time North and South America had over a hundred million people. Then the Spanish conquistadors came to Peru and with about a hundred and seventy soldiers they took down a nation of 20 million.

Within several hundred years, the diseases spread by the Europeans took out about 90% of the population in North and South America. Today Peru is a very poor country. More than 50% of the economy is basically off the books. People cannot afford to build houses because they do not have the money. They build one room at a time because they can't borrow money with 20% interest rates.

Lima is the capital of Peru and the city areas and the rich suburbs are quite beautiful and fun to visit. However, there are a lot of areas of town that are run down and a lot of unfinished homes. Just outside the city, there's a very large squatter's village that is very poor and the conditions are somewhat appalling.

Conditions out in the countryside are much nicer. We visited the Sacred Valley which is the ancestral home of the Inca Empire. Included in the Sacred Valley is a small town called Yerbamba where we had dinner with a local family. This family had a house with a wood burning stove. The floors were of dirt. However, the meal was delicious and we had a great time with the family and with the children. The children sang for us and it was quite entertaining. The Peruvian people really enjoy everyday things and celebrate life. So in spite of their lack of resources, they make the best of it.

Azerbaijan is formerly a Soviet Socialist Republic. It is currently a democracy, theoretically, but they have a strong man who acts like a dictator. You see his posters all over the country, even in the remotest part of the countryside. Azerbaijan has vast oil wealth in the Caspian Sea. However, there are still some major industrial eyesores left in the Baku area from the Soviet development of resources. You can actually see this in a James Bond movie, The World is Not Enough.

In 2005, about 95% of the cars in Azerbaijan were Russian Ladas. These are very inexpensive cars that are a design rip-off of the Italian Fiat. The other 5% are rich people's expensive Mercedes and foreign contractors black SUVs. It is very strange to see a traffic jam in downtown Baku because all the cars are identically the same and with a slight difference in color and the amount of rusting. By 2007, this had changed dramatically as the oil wealth began to filter down and people were able to afford newer, better cars.

The police and traffic cops are basically ignored by the rich people and by the foreigners. I had to observe this phenomenon before I could believe it. I actually saw a Mercedes barreling down on a police officer with his baton raised high next to his car. The Mercedes just barreled on by and as soon as he went by, the policemen turned around and started looking for more speeding cars.

It is interesting to note the Soviet-style administration buildings and high-rise apartments in Azerbaijan. Basically this is something that's been replicated throughout the entire Soviet empire. I observed almost identical designs for buildings and apartments in the Baltic states and in Russia itself.

Egypt was one of the first world powers in ancient times. They built monuments that are still wonders of the world even today. During our visit, we met some very highly educated Egyptians that were westernizing their attitudes and capabilities. Nevertheless, Egypt is still a very poor third world country. Its number one industry is tourism and it has a small elite rich class that runs the country. The country is mostly arid with large areas of desert. There are large population centers that live on the river delta areas like Cairo and Alexandria. Cairo has a very serious smog problem. When we were flying in, we could hardly see the pyramids even though we flew directly over them. When we wanted to take a photo of the pyramids, we had to wait for the smog to rise before we could get a decent photo. In Cairo, they did not have any stop signs or stop lights. Needless to say crossing a street was a challenge.

One of the side trips we took when we were in Egypt was a camel ride up to the top of Mount Sinai. I met a man up there, an Arab or a Bedouin, that who claimed his name was Abraham. Abraham was interested in my watch. It was very old sports watch. I gave it to Abraham, so I could say that I gave Abraham my watch on Mount Sinai.

When we visited Egypt, the women there were more liberated than in most Muslim countries. In fact, they had passed a law four years earlier that made them more equal in divorce actions. After the law went into effect, the divorce rate went from 10% to 50%, very similar to the U.S. In Egypt, they have Bedouin tribes that live in the desert areas. These are almost like independent nations that operate as if they're in a different country. We actually rode camels out to a Bedouin camp, and had dinner under the stars with the Bedouins. We took another side trip into Jordan to visit the ancient city of Petra and rode in the back of a pickup truck to visit Bedouin encampments in the Wadi Rum Desert.

About a month after we left Eqypt, they actually had a revolution in Egypt where they overthrew the president, Hosni Mubarak. We had a friend who was one of our guides during our Egyptian tour. He was also a Coptic Christian and a very fine professional photographer. We were/are friends on Facebook, and he was posting photos in real time as the protests proceeded. It was very interesting to see the activities in that square in real time and to know that they were making progress toward a more democratic society and the potential for great economic prosperity if they could break free of the bonds of a dictatorship.



What does 2025 hold? The training team has initial plans in place and we will continue modifying it to adjust to new needs. The most import new element is a series of online classes covering basic photography. A successful learning initiative requires many people and we need your input to keep improving. 





Diaries of Home

on exhibit at The Modern November 17, 2024 - February 2, 2025

Diaries of Home features works by women and nonbinary artists, who explore the multilayered concepts of family, community, and home.

These artists challenge documentary photography by pushing it into conceptual, performative, and theatrical realms. They probe preconceptions about domestic, familial, and communal spaces in the United States, which are often considered feminine spheres. Such environments and their relationship to feminism and feminist art have a history dating back to the 1970s—especially in photography, where women artists have been among the strongest voices. The photographers presented in Diaries of Home show us the dynamics of both biological and constructed families; for example, Sally Mann takes up her three children as subject matter in lush portraits that are intimate and compelling, while Nan Goldin portrays her lover and group of friends as a kind of chosen family. Each artist offers visual narratives ranging from the very personal to broader examinations of society in works that depict tales of love, desire, loss, home, and the intricacies of human relationships.

The artists in Diaries of Home use the vernacular of documentary photography, which creates an immediate sense of familiarity and understanding. Yet, the works subvert the implied truthfulness of the imagery by exploring the medium's inherent subjectivity through enticing fiction and drama, or by magnifying everyday affairs. The affection, kinship, hardship, and deeply intimate narratives captured lend a diaristic quality to the photographs, creating a conceptual focal point that inspired the exhibition's title.

In 2005, slides were combined with projected digital images to create the projected images category. Slides were eliminated in 2008. Club competitions are now focused on color prints, monochrome prints and digital projected images.

The DCC hosts contests and events including monthly competitions, field trips, workshops, programs of general interest, an awards banquet and an annual competition (the "Bird") between DCC and Fort Worth Camera Club members.
