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
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Fellow of the Dallas Camera Club (FDCC) Active Members

Fireworks in the Digital Age: From film to digital to "in camera" controls

Some might say that photography has gotten too damned easy! In the film days, getting an acceptable fireworks shot was a crap shoot. For me, shooting slides, it was a good evening to get a few frames that caught multiple bursts layered on one another. It would then take at least a week after the show to know for sure that I got anything at all. Now it's simply a matter of pointing the camera where you think something will appear and pressing a button a few times. Looking at the screen on the back of the camera lets you know how you are lined up and whether you need to adjust your framing. The computer in my camera takes care of everything else.

For the July DIY Independence Day Celebration field trip, I wanted to try a feature on my Olympus OM-1 camera that I had yet to use: Live Composite Mode. Live Composite is a computational photography option in which one can "stack" successive exposures on a single base frame in camera without overexposing the photo. Very simply, once you have composed your shot, you make a base exposure. Then, when the fireworks start going off, you press the exposure button again, at that point, the camera adds only new <u>data (light)</u> to successive exposures until you press the button again to stop the process. From here on it is simply a matter of making a base exposure then starting the compositing, which you watch build up on the back of the camera, stopping when you feel you have enough. Then repeat.

To accomplish my mission, I arrived at Richardson's Breckenridge Park several hours before sundown on July Fourth. I want to stake out a spot across the lake from the rocket launch site. I set up my lawn chair and tripod and waited for darkness. Using manual focus, I set my lens at infinity and my aperture at f/11. In the Live Composite menu, I selected the ½ sec exposure time. I had initially oriented my camera in a vertical position (wanting to get the apex of the bursts as well as reflections in the lake) but after the first firework sequence, I realized I needed to switch to horizontal. When I did that, I lost my level base which necessitated correcting in post-processing, so I ended up with far less water for reflections.



For my first experience with the Live Composite feature, I think the images came out well. I processed the Raw files in LR and applied Noise Reduction with Enhance. The bold colors and crisp lines make me anxious to try it on star trails, clouds, and taillights. It's really not much more than point and shoot, it couldn't be any easier than that!

Your longest lens will probably give you the best images of the action, but short focal lengths work well for crowd shots and the post-game fireworks. Tripods will be allowed but not on the grass playing field.



WHAT: DCC Caddo Lake Fall Color

WHERE: Caddo Lake, Uncertain, TX

WHEN: Friday, November 7 - Sunday, November 9, 2025

The Dallas Camera Club is going to Caddo Lake this year for its annual Fall Color field trip. It has been almost 10 years since the club last visited Caddo Lake, so many members may not be familiar with the lake. Here is a short introduction. For more details, see the links at the end of this article.

Caddo Lake is one of Texas' few natural lakes. Some say the only one. It is also one of 27 wetlands in the US recognized by Ramsar Convention. Lodging and boat rentals are centered around the tiny town of Uncertain, Texas, population less than 100. Caddo Lake is on the Texas–Louisiana border about 3 hours east of Dallas. It has diverse aquatic plant life and wildlife in a bald cypress swamp with a bottomland hardwood forest. It is home to 190 species of trees and shrubs, 22 species of amphibians, 47 mammal species and more than 220 kinds of birds. Over 40 of the native bird species are endangered. Here are a few photos from around the lake.





LOCATION:

The red arrow on the map below points to Caddo Lake. Uncertain, Tx will be our destination to get to Caddo. It is 170 miles from Dallas taking I20 and it takes about 3 hours to get there.



Fall color is becoming a really big deal at Caddo with photographers coming from all over the US. Groups are already booking lodging and boats.

The club has booked 3 boats which will hold a total of 22 photographers. These boats will be available for all 4 scheduled cruises on a first come basis. If the need exists, we will try to find more boats. The boats are 20', 22' and 24' pontoon boats. Boats will all leave from, or near to, the Johnson Ranch Marina.

There are only two small motels in Uncertain which describe themselves as lodges, inns or resorts - the Uncertain Lodge and Inn, and the Shady Glade Resort. There are a few 2 to 5 unit "motels" as well. The State Park also has cabins and campgrounds (these can only be booked 5 months in advance). Other cabins and houses in town are available as well. You will need to make you own arrangements for your party.

Our field trip revolves around photo boat cruises at sunrise (6:40 am) and sunset (5:20 pm). The big picture plan is below. We will put times on these activities as we get closer to the field trip.

The area around Uncertain is shown in more detail below. The main objective is photographing from a boat out on the lake. There are other interesting things around Uncertain to checkout during the day on Saturday or coming or going. These include canoeing or kayaking on the lake, the shoreline around Uncertain, Caddo Lake State Park, Caddo Lake State Wildlife Management Area, Caddo Lake National Wildlife Refuge, and Jefferson, TX.



We will have dinner at the Big Pines Lodge just outside of Uncertain on Saturday evening after the sunset photo cruise.

I gravitate toward landscape photography. I like the beauty and variety in the natural world. And most importantly rocks and trees mostly stay in one place and don't talk back. 





FIREWORKS - HOW AND WHERE was previously published in the July 2001 Thru The Lens issue. This article is shared more for a historical perspective of how far photographic equipment has evolved, yet even today regardless of whether film or digital cameras are used, most of the same settings and techniques to shoot fireworks still apply.

The new crop of computerized, auto-exposure, autofocus cameras assist photographers in virtually every phase of capturing image. In many cases, all the photographer has to do is compose the image; the camera does the rest.

Shooting fireworks, however, brings the photographer back to the basics. Auto-focus and autoexposure have little benefit when capturing fireworks on film.

Kodak, in the Pocket Photoguide, recommends the following for great fireworks images:

1. Use a tripod.

2. Use an appropriate lens opening for your film.

ISO 100: f/8; ISO 200: f/11; ISO 400: f/16

3. Use a shutter speed of B (bulb) and a remote shutter release. Open the shutter at the moment of explosion, and hold it open while the fireworks burst decays.

4. Capture multiple bursts on one frame. If your camera is not capable multiple exposures on one film frame, you can achieve the same results by opening the shutter with a remote release with the lens cap in place. Carefully remove the lens cap to capture a burst. Replace the lens cap once you have captured the firework image.

5. On auto-focus cameras, set focus to manual and focus at infinity, to prevent the camera's focusing system from "hunting" against the night sky.


