Jay Hoppenstein has been a member of the Dallas Camera Club since April of 2006. He holds the designation of "Master Photographer" in



the club. In 2015 he was awarded the "Fellowship Award" in recognition of his excellent photographic ability.

In 2013 he was awarded the "Distinguished Service Award" for his contribution of personal time and effort to make our camera club the best it can be. Jay is the former Editor of *Thru the Lens*, the Club's monthly

newsletter from 2011 through 2023. This is a big responsibility, and, to my knowledge, Jay has never missed an issue. This is exceptional considering the complexity of the newsletter and the fact that Jay did it all himself.

The quality of the newsletter was always professional, and it has won 1st place among competing camera clubs. However, it is not just Jay's awards that make him a leader in our club.

In 2018 DCC sponsored the Gulf States Camera Club Council's (GSCCC) annual meeting. We realized early in the process that we would need about ten team members, would have numerous meetings, and needed a place to meet. Jay graciously volunteered his home as a meeting place and for the next several months provided us with a very agreeable site to have our meetings. This is indicative of Jay's willingness to help others be successful, which says a great deal about Jay as a person.

In addition to his responsibilities as editor of the newsletter, in years past, Jay also volunteered to assist on the "house" committee which has the responsibility of setting up the audio/visual equipment on their success. Whenever the club has a field trip photo shoot, Jay always participates. Whenever Jay sees an opportunity to help another member, he is always there. Jay always has positive things to say about his associates and I have never heard him say a single negative word about anyone. Jay takes an interest in the personal lives of the people he meets. Words can describe a person and the things that they have done, but it is difficult to convey the heart of a relationship. Perhaps the best way to do that is to say that I am glad that a man like Jay exists and I am glad that he is my friend. My world is a better place because I know Jay Hoppenstein.

Next Month's Field Trip: Eureka Springs, AR - November 1-5, 2023 Plan now to join Dallas Camera Club to photograph fall color in the Ozark Mountains

Eureka Springs is one of only twelve "Distinctive Destinations in America" according to the National Trust for Historic Preservation. It was founded in 1879 and many of its Victorian homes are still standing. Eureka Springs has been called the "Little Switzerland of America" and

View Eureka Springs Visitor Guide the "Stairstep Town" because of its resemblance to European mountain towns. Eureka Springs (Eureka Springs | Arkansas.com)

is also known as "The City that Water Built" because of the many springs that have been used by humans for thousands of years.

Eureka Springs is about a six-hour drive from Dallas in Northwest Arkansas. In addition to the immediate area around town (there should be a lot of photographic opportunities there, 16 Top Things to Do in Eureka Springs, Arkansas - usnews.com) you can head east to Harrison to access the Maple Wood Cemetery (Best Places to See Gorgeous Fall Color in Arkansas - Somewhere In Arkansas) and the Headquarters of the Buffalo National River (Buffalo National River U.S. National Park Service - nps.gov). On another day you may wish to go west to Bentonville and visit Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art and see where some of the money you have spent at Walmart has gone. The area is rich in man-made and natural beauty (Ultimate NWA Fall Color Guide - Only In Arkansas, https://memphisprofessionalphotographer.com/ fall-colors-of-arkansas/) to keep you busy for a few days. Just be careful driving down little dirt roads in the woods: if you hear banjo music, TURN AROUND!

The Fabrication Yard is a collection of abandoned buildings in an industrial area that acts as a public canvas for graffiti. It is a visual cornucopia of color and artistry.

Once we had shot our fill of murals and decay, we moved on over to the Dallas Farmer's Market. If you are like me, it's been many years since you last visited (if you ever have). The farmer's market of today is not the farmer's market I remember from years ago. Sure, it's in the location but there are far fewer "farmers" involved and it's a lot brighter and cleaner! Still, there were cold drinks available and even some AC. And it's a great place for people and dog photography.

Our next stop of the morning was to be the Cathedral Guadalupe on Ross Ave. This is the church of a half dozen that were contacted to say we could come with tripods and photograph interiors. However, a wedding had been scheduled for that morning and we were initially denied entry but with persistence, we got in, briefly.

This field trip was initially conceived to be a tour of several churches to photograph stained glass windows and pipe organs. That didn't work out, but our small band of intrepid shutterbugs had a pretty good morning shooting interesting subjects.

Four of us left the cathedral for a short walk to Klyde Warren Park for lunch where we picked up two more. We enjoyed lunch at Mi Cocina in the comfort of air conditioning. All in all it was a good day for photography.

as it is known today, got its name from a bird sculpture donated by artist Emily Guthrie Smith. In 1964 the sculpture was introduced as the perpetual trophy that the winning club would hold on to until the next year and became known as the Emily Guthrie Smith Award. However, the annual rivalry between DCC and FWCC actually got its start four years earlier in 1960. At that time, DCC President

"The Bird" Competition,

Turgut Ulug, teamed up with FWCC President James Midgett, and began an annual interclub competition. Four years later the bird trophy was introduced and became the contest's namesake. Thanks to the digitizing and archival work by Steven Reeves who also serves as DCC's club historian, we were able to document DCC / FWCC interclub contest results for years 1960-1963, prior to the introduction of the bird trophy.

FWCC is a fierce competitor and DCC is without a doubt the underdog in this annual battle. With 61 years of contest results on record. FWCC has won 39 times and DCC has only prevailed 22 times.

Emily Guthrie Smith Award (The BIRD)

In 1960, Turgut Ulug, DCC Pres dent, teamed up with James Midgett, President of the Fort Worth Camera Club, to start the Annual Dallas/Fort Worth Inter club Competition. The BIRD on, as it has be mown, has been held between he two clubs each year since

The BIRD is a perpetual trophy. which is an original sculpture do-nated by Emily Guthrie Smith and goes to the winning club each year. Emily Guthrie Smith was a cognized Fort Worth nationary recognized Fort worth artist, who was elected to the Hall of Fame of the Pastel Society of America and was honored with a one-woman show at the Fort Worth Art Museum in 1966.

I published essentially the same 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 11 fifty page book through three different printers. The first two publishers books were only 56 pages, but I added a couple for the third. More about that later. Here were the costs and results:

I. Blurb – total cost was \$78.89. The colors weren't great, but I think I exported the pictures as AdobeRGB, so that might have been my fault. By the time I figured that out, I found a less expensive printer to try. That book hasn't come yet. If you go through Blurb, be sure to export as sRGB.

2.Mpix – total cost was 164.49 for a beautiful heavy card stock book with lay-flat pages. As a first-time customer I got a 25% discount. The same book in regular binding would have been 99.00 or so.

3. Looking for a less expensive option because a

couple of people said they would like a copy, and I found Lulu.com. It's a very different process.

The other companies had templates and you just dragged in your images and typed the text. Lulu requires a PDF with specific bleed, gutter, etc. Then you create a cover PDF, and they do have an online tool for that.

I used InDesign to create the PDF. The website has a preview so you can see how your book will turn out, so it's not quite as scary. It's a lot more work, but the cost for printing and shipping was only \$29.26.

You probably don't want to sell your book through Lulu unless you can command a very healthy price for it. Say you have them print and distribute. They give you 80% of the net – that's after printing, distribution and shipping costs. The charts below show how that eats into your money, split into what you receive if Lulu sells through their bookstore and if they distribute through Amazon, etc.

The advantage of selling through Lulu exclusively is that you make more per book, and the advantage of global distribution is that you have more exposure. The other option is to order the book in bulk and handle distribution yourself or market it on Amazon and ship yourself.

ISBN, Etc.

So... I decided as long as I was going to all the trouble to use InDesign and publish a proper book, I might as well make it distributable. To do that you have to have an ISBN number and a copyright page. I got all fancy and wrote a dedication, too. Every iteration of your book has to have its own ISBN number, so if you are going to do a paperback and hardbound book, you need two.

So to get the ISBN, I went through https://www. isbnservices.com/. It cost \$22.99 for one ISBN number. I don't know if it's the least expensive site, but it's definitely not the most. If you plan

to write several books, you can get a pack of 10 at a discount. Then after you finish the book, you can register the ISBN through them. You can also generate the barcode from your dashboard.

You own the copyright to your book the minute you write it, but if you want to protect that copyright, you can also register it with the Library of Congress. To register a copyright, you must submit three things to the Copyright Office:

• A completed application form. In most instances, you can submit an online form or

mail a paper form. Online applications have lower filing fees and faster processing times than paper applications.

- A filing fee for online forms or paper forms.
- Copies of the work you are registering. Copies may be electronic – your original PDF will do. Wait until you have finished the book – including all the proofing and editing. Trust me on this. If you make any changes to your document after uploading, you have to get another ISBN and start all over.

I have made two handcrafted books with a landscape theme.

The first book was printed on Japanese Awagami Kozo paper cut to size. Kozo is a thin paper with some transparency. Each small printed sheet was leafed in gold on the underside.

Each sheet was then stitched with a sewing machine to a heavier backing sheet. These sheets were then glued to prefolded card stock and nested to create a small accordion book. The front and back covers - title and colophon were printed on translucent vellum. The book is bound with gold cord.

THE PHOTOGRAPHY COMPETITION AT THE STATE FAIR OF TEXAS

The Dallas Camera Club sponsored the first Photography Exhibition at the Texas State Fair in 1960. This fact is not mentioned in the history of the State Fair of Texas nor is it included in any historical society information. DCC is listed as co-sponsor and posts a call for entries in this August 15, 1961 issue of *Thru the Lens* as well as in two newspaper articles from that time.



Outside Competition & Exhibition: North Texas Fair & Rodeo, Denton Congratulations to Janice Goetz

Every year, the North Texas Fair & Rodeo hosts an Amateur Photography Contest sponsored by the Denton Record-Chronicle. This year, the Fair was held August 18 - 26, 2023.

Rosettes are awarded in each Division, for Grand Champion and for Reserve Champion. There are four possible Divisions offered for adults. Two of these are North Texas Fair & Rodeo (NTF&R)-Related Category and Special Category. Entries for the NTF&R-Related Category are open to ALL ages and are restricted to images taken at the North Texas Fair & Rodeo within the last 3 consecutive years. The winner of this category will have their image on display in the Fair office for an additional 30 days. A different theme is announced every year for the Special Category, and is also open to ALL ages. This year the theme for Special Category was (Digitally Enhanced), defined as images that have been altered for the purpose of making the subject of the photo and the photo itself look better than the original photo or for creative use.

Winners were announced on Friday, August 18. Janice Goetz was awarded Grand Champion AND Reserve Champion in the NTF&R-Related Category and Grand Champion in the Special Category. Images submitted for the NTF&R-Related Category were taken during her very first visit to the North Texas Fair & Rodeo in 2022. Janice used the Waterlogue App to enhance her image for the Special Category. Her goal was to make her photo look more like a watercolor image rather than a photograph.

I decided to participate in the photo contest last year simply to encourage my grandchildren to enter. The oldest entered several photos and the younger ones entered some of their art. They all received ribbons and/or prize money. This year, I didn't even have to ask. It was their idea, so I decided to join them!

As an added bonus, last year's Jr. Princess spotted her photo and her friend's photo on exhibit and was really excited that both photos won blue ribbons. Her mom took a picture of her daughter pointing at her picture and found me on FaceBook. As a result, I get to meet her and donate the photos of her and of her friend, as well as the blue ribbons to these sweet little girls.

Two Generations: Paul Caponigro & John Paul Caponigro

on exhibit at Obscura Gallery, Santa Fe, NM, September 15 - November 18

The father, Paul Caponigro is one of America's foremost landscape photographers. Caponigro is best known for his interest in natural forms, landscapes, and still lives. His subjects include Stonehenge and other Celtic megaliths of England and Ireland; the temples, shrines and sacred gardens of Japan; and the deep mystical woodland of New England. His had his first solo exhibition at the George Eastman House in 1958 and his work has been shown in numerous exhibitions throughout the United States and abroad. Throughout the 1960s he was a part-time teacher at Boston University while consulting on various technical research projects with the Polaroid Corporation. He has received two Guggenheim Fellowships and three National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) grants. In recognition of a career spanning nearly seventy years



and a sustained, significant contribution to the art of photography, Caponigro was awarded The Royal Photographic Society's Centenary Medal and Honorary Fellowship in 2001 and in 2020 was the Honoree for the Achievement in Fine Art presented by the Lucie Awards.

The son, John Paul is a pioneer among visual artists working with digital media. He consults

with the corporations that build the tools he uses, including Adobe, Apple, Canon, Kodak, and Sony. A member of the Photoshop Hall of Fame, Epson's Stylus Pros, and X-Rite's Coloratti, his work is published widely in periodicals and books, including Art News and The Ansel Adams Guide.



Denton Modernism on exhibit at PDNB Gallery through October 7

It is no small thing that a women's college in the small town of Denton, Texas started the first studio art program in a Texas public university system. And it is not insignificant to know that most of the teachers for this early studio program at Texas State College for Women (TSCW) studied art at Columbia University in New York.



Art historians in our region discovered that the notable painter, educator, Arthur Wesley Dow, taught these future Denton educators. He also taught Georgia O'Keeffe and Charles Sheeler. These future teachers also studied with the great Modernists such as Hans Hoffman and

László Moholy-Nagy. The tendrils of Modernism

spread from these women to their students at TSCW, later known as Texas Woman's University (TWU).

Robert Frank & Todd Webb: Across America, 1955

In 1955 photographers Robert Frank and Todd Webb received fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation for U.S. survey projects. Frank's cross country trip would result in the celebrated book *The Americans*. We was awarded a grant to walk, boat, and bike across the United States to depict the "vanishing Americana, and the way of life that is taking its place".

Even though both Frank and Webb had been recommended for the project by famed photographer Walker Evans, neither one was aware of the others work at the time. In



some instances, Frank's and Webbs work looks strikingly similar, but these similarities can be traced to popular cultural trends and shared ideology.

Annie Leibovitz at Work

The Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art in Bentonville, Arkansas has an exhibition of portrait work by famed photographer Annie Leibovitz on view through January 29, 2024. In addition to her iconic and daring pictures for magazines like *Rolling Stone, Vanity Fair*, and *Vogue*, the show includes a set of new works made just for Crystal Bridges - Leibovitz's first museum commission.

When Leibovitz first came to Bentonville to photograph Alice Walton, Crystal Bridges invited her to create something for the museum, offering her the opportunity to make new work without conditions or limitations: "They didn't ask what I wanted to photograph or where I wanted to go. I realized that



I wanted to update my work. It is an opportunity to do something that I couldn't do for anyone else. The strength of my work is seeing the pictures together, like brothers and sisters. That's what makes it interesting. It's full of history." Leibovitz said.

Whether highlighting household names or local heroes, these works demonstrate Leibovitz's discerning vision and desire to celebrate the extraordinary now. When

Jay Hoppenstein was born in Dallas, TX in 1938, attended public schools, graduated from Hillcrest High School and attended the University of Texas in Austin. Jay went to UT Southwestern Medical School in Dallas, TX. After completing his residency he entered into the United States Air Force, and following his honorable discharge with the rank of a Major, began his general surgical practice of medicine in Dallas, TX at Baylor University Medical Center in 1971. Upon his retirement in 2005 as Chairman of the Department of Surgery at Presbyterian Hospital, Jay pursued his interests in sailboat racing, travel and, of course, photography.

Jay began taking pictures as an early teenager and explored film photography through its evolution into digital. During the summers while in high school, he worked for Southwest Film Laboratory as

part of a film crew that created monthly films for TV shows about life in Texas.

He learned to develop black and white film, making enlargements in his closet of a darkroom, embraced color slide photography, constructed complex audio-visual slide shows for schools and honored Dallas personalities, hosted, together with his wife, Carole Ann, a 30 minute monthly television show, *Covenant*, aired on WFAA TV (8 episodes), joined the Dallas Camera Club decades ago and became the editor of the TTL in 2011. He has become a DCC Master Photographer and has been bestowed the designation of a Fellow of the Dallas Camera Club in 2013.

While editor of the DCC's newsletter, the TTL was awarded The Directors *Best of the Best* 1st Place in the *Photographic Society of America's* (PSA) newsletter competition for the April 2015 issue. The TTL was awarded **Honorable Mention** in the 2019 and 2021 PSA Newsletter contest. The TTL was awarded **Second Place** in the 2023 PSA Competition.

Jay loves the DCC's monthly print and projected image competitions. He always creates a 5 minute AV show for the annual potpourri and participates in most of the DCC field trips. Over the years he has won the following DCC and Gulf States awards:

As a kid, I would always be the one taking snapshots with my box camera, only in black and white since color was too expensive to get developed at the local drug store.

After graduating from college, my wife and I got a job with a teenage travel camp. We traveled across the country visiting nine of our national parks. A former roommate of mine, who was now in the air force stationed in Japan, sent me a gift of Yashica IC lynx 14 E Range Finder camera. For the two summers we traveled I took 35mm slides of the parks and cities we visited. I then produced a slide show using the Kodak slide carousels, which I then presented to my students.

I continued to take family snapshots for years as my family grew while the point shoot cameras kept improving. I did not need a better camera.

When I was working as a high school Guidance Counselor, I began using some of the newest personal computers in the

schools. I acquired a digital camera, the Sony Mavica, MVC-FD7. This camera saved the images on a 5x5 floppy disk. An image could then be inserted into your computer and included in your correspondence and then printed instantly. This is the first time, for me, that I could combine my office work with photography.

With film still being the most affordable medium, I began taking more and more pictures with my new Canon T 10. I was asked to take pictures of the High School band at both the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade and the Rose Bowl Parade. Some of my pictures were published in local newspapers and in the school's yearbooks.

Once my two daughters were grown and in college my wife and I left our positions as school administrators and began to work in educational publishing. I soon got my first real digital camera, a Nikon D 90 with a fixed zoom lens. The publisher, based in Austin, needed pictures that I took of Yellowstone National Park on our cross-country trips.

Several images of mine were published in a Science Encyclopedia and a State book series.

At this juncture in our lives, we began to move throughout the country for work and we were able to travel a lot more. I took pictures wherever we went, and my wife created a photo book of all of our adventures.

After some of the publishers we represented merged, we decided to move to Dallas to be closer to our grandchildren and start our own business. Being close to our grandchildren increased the value and utility of my photography.

In 2014, my wife bought me a Nikon D3300 camera kit from Costco for Father's Day. I quickly paired it with a Nikkor S 18-300 zoom lens. A few weeks later, we were at a fundraising dinner and my wife mentioned buying me a new camera. One of the people at the table said, "Great,

Dallas Camera Club (DCC) was organized in 1934 by 52 printmakers meeting twice a month to improve their photographic skills. Color slides were added, presumably in the 1940s, and color print competitions were added in 1970. In 1998, images from digital files were first accepted into DCC competitions. In 2005, slides were combined with projected digital images to create the projected images category. Slides were eliminated in 2008. Club competitions are now focused on color prints, monochrome prints and digital projected images.

The objective of the club is "the mutual entertainment and education of its members in all forms of amateur photographic art." The DCC hosts contests and events including monthly competitions, field trips, workshops, programs of general interest, an awards banquet and an annual competition (the "Bird") between DCC and Fort Worth Camera Club members. The DCC emphasizes intra-club competition as a learning process. Importance is placed on helping the beginner or new member feel at ease, ask questions, learn and participate.

Next Month in DCC History: November 6, 1962

Although the BIRD officially started in 1964, according to DCC history documents, an old issue of Thru the Lens written in November 1962 reveals that competitions between the Fort Worth Camera Club and the Dallas Camera Club were already engaged in friendly competition. The theme of the 1962 joint meeting was Nature. The previous year was Advertising Photography. Submissions were in slide and print format. The Fort Worth club was the overall winner. Was this a prediction?



The Emily Guthrie Smith Award, affectionately referred to as "The BIRD", has been awarded to the winner of The BIRD competition most every year since 1964 in October or early November. There are two years when either the contest wasn't held or records are missing. Its always been Dallas Camera Club vs. Fort Worth Camera Club and attending the BIRD is a great opportunity to meet fellow neighbor photographers.

Each camera club submits their members Each camera club submits their members best 30 images including 15 prints (color or monochrome) and 15 projected images. The prints are judged real-time at the meeting by a panel of judges. The club with the most points at the end of the evening wins and holds onto The BIRD trophy until next year.

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Dallas Camera Club (DCC) is a member of Gulf States Camera Club Council (GSCCC) and the Photographic Society of America (PSA).

GSCCC currently has 35 camera club organization members from Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas.
