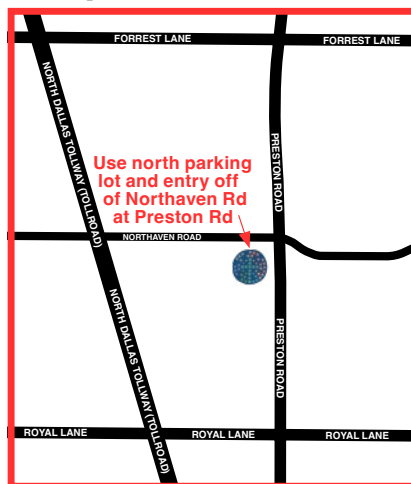

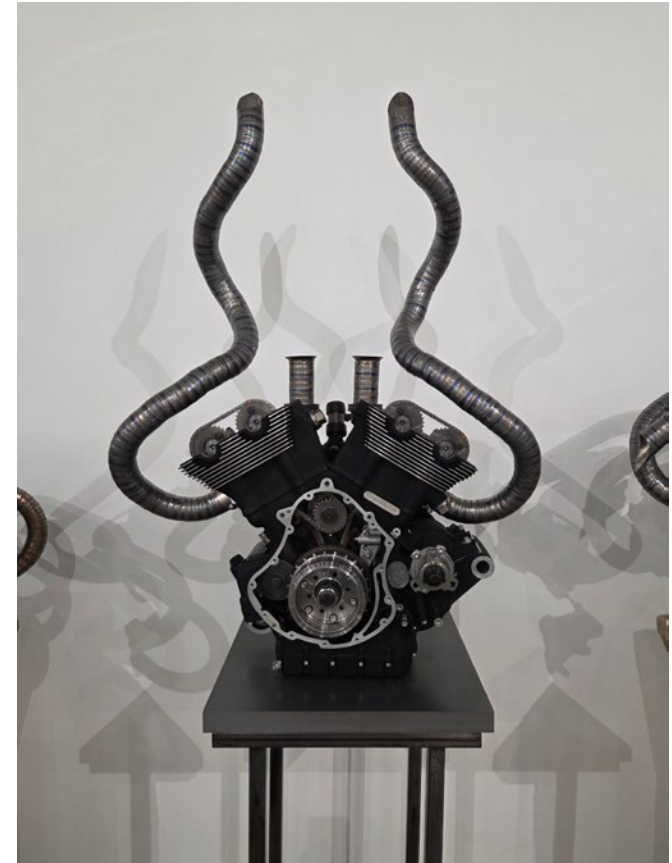

return home after the exhibit. Some of us may wish to spend the night and have dinner together. There is much to see and do in and around OKC so consider making a weekend out of the trip.

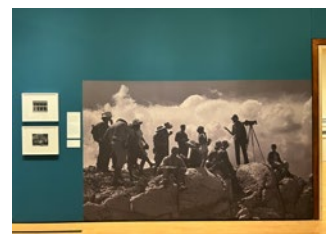
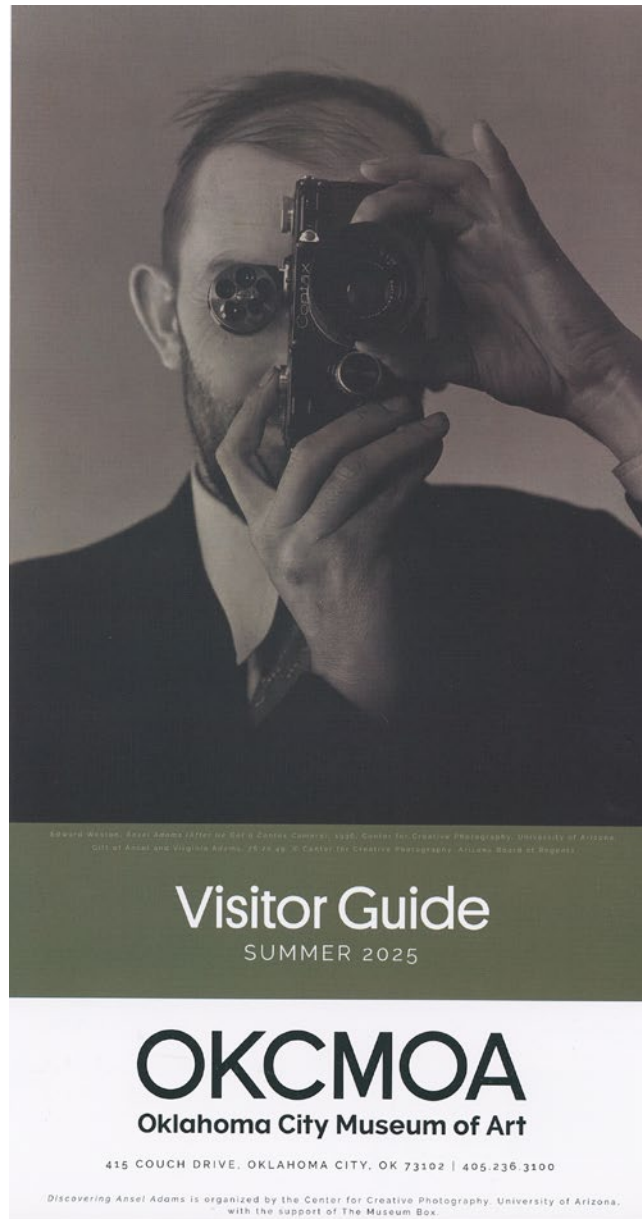

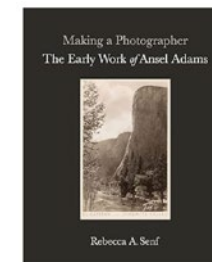

The Dallas Camera Club is going to Caddo Lake this year for its annual Fall Color field trip. It has been almost 10 years since the club last visited Caddo Lake, so many members may not be familiar with the lake. Here is a short introduction. For more details, see the links at the end of this article.

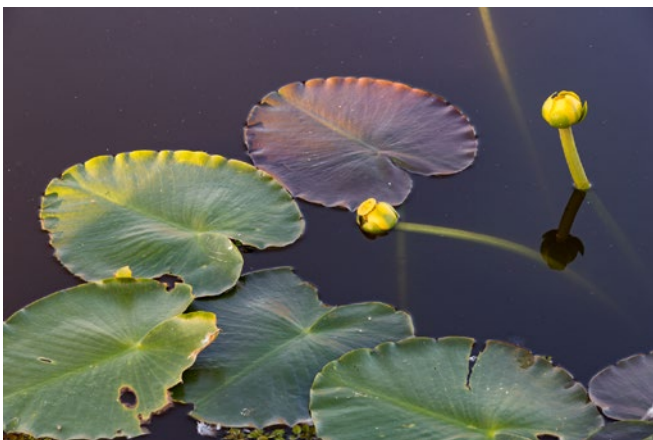
Caddo Lake is one of Texas' few natural lakes. Some say the only one. It is also one of 27 wetlands in the US recognized by Ramsar Convention. Lodging and boat rentals are centered around the tiny town of Uncertain, Texas, population less than 100. Caddo Lake is on the Texas–Louisiana border about 3 hours east of Dallas. It has diverse aquatic plant life and wildlife in a bald cypress swamp with a bottomland hardwood forest. It is home to 190 species of trees and shrubs, 22 species of amphibians, 47 mammal species and more than 220 kinds of birds. Over 40 of the native bird species are endangered. Here are a few photos from around the lake.

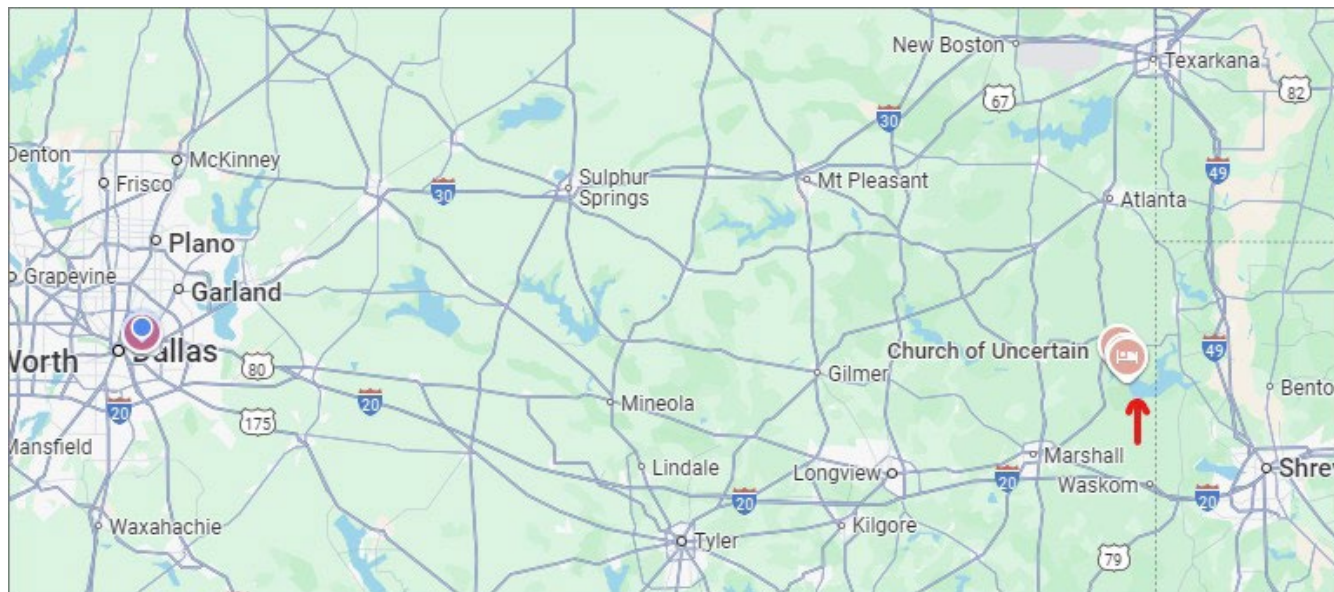

LOCATION:

The red arrow on the map below points to Caddo Lake. Uncertain, Tx will be our destination to get to Caddo. It is 170 miles from Dallas taking I20 and it takes about 3 hours to get there.



Fall color is becoming a really big deal at Caddo with photographers coming from all over the US. Groups are already booking lodging and boats.

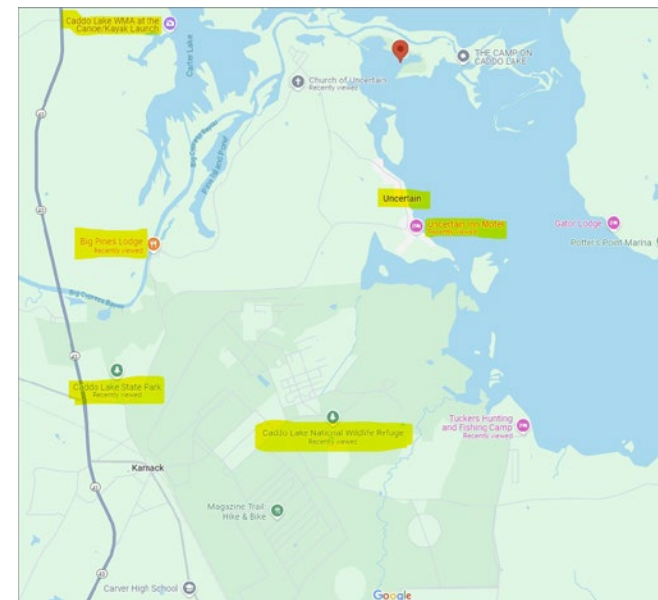
The club has booked 3 boats which will hold a total of 22 photographers. These boats will be available for all 4 scheduled cruises on a first come basis. If the need exists, we will try to find more boats. The boats are 20', 22' and 24' pontoon boats. Boats will all leave from, or near to, the [Johnson's Ranch Marina](#).

There are only two small motels in Uncertain which describe themselves as lodges, inns or resorts - the Uncertain Lodge and Inn, and the Shady Glade Resort. There are a few 2 to 5 unit "motels" as well. The State Park also has cabins and campgrounds (these can only be booked 5 months in advance). Other cabins and houses in town are available as well. You will need to make your own arrangements for your party.

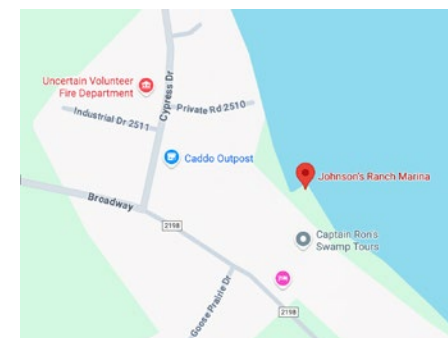
Our field trip revolves around photo boat cruises at sunrise (6:40 am) and sunset (5:20 pm). The big picture plan is below. We will put times on these activities as we get closer to the field trip.

Kay Hale: Impact in Photography III

Potter Stewart, a Supreme Court Judge, memorably said that he could not say what obscenity was, but he knew it when he saw it. A variation on the idea that "you knew it when you saw it" captures the idea about what impact is in photography. When you see a photograph with impact, you immediately have a reaction of "WOW." There is a sense of surprise upon seeing it for the first time. It catches your eye, is striking in appearance, and it is typically creative, unique, and out of what is ordinarily seen. It invites the observer to "take a longer look."

Many have said that the three elements of judging a photograph are technique, composition, and impact. Dennis Fritzsche altered that idea and famously said that the three most important factors to judge a photograph were IMPACT, IMPACT, and IMPACT. Impact can take many forms. Color, composition, emotion, light, subject matter, uniqueness, creativity, and simplicity are just some of the elements that are involved in impact. How to make greater impact with your photographs is the goal of this program.

About Kay Hale

A brief view of my life in photography is the following: My first camera was a gift for my 16th birthday. The focus of my photography for many years was taking photos of the people in my life and vacation pictures. I first attended the Dallas Camera Club in the spring of 1979 and went to two meetings at the Coca Cola Bottling Company but did not join. I had other priorities in my life then. Formal membership in the DCC occurred in 1989. My attendance at meetings was sporadic for many years, but starting in 2009, the year I purchased a digital camera, my attendance at meetings has been very high. Saying that, I did not start entering competitions until 2012. Had I entered monthly competitions earlier, I would have become a better photographer sooner.

I have a highly eclectic range of interests in photography: street photography, city scenes, architecture, night photography, photo/art, abstracts, and nature/landscapes. My travels for photography the last few years tells you much of where I am with my photography these days. Over the last few years, I have had six trips of a week or longer. Four of these trips were to large metropolitan areas (New York, London, San Francisco, and Chicago) and two were to areas classified as landscape photography (Denali National Park in Alaska and Ghost Ranch in New Mexico.) As you can imagine the trip to Alaska and Ghost Ranch for a week were all about landscape photography, whereas the trips to the metropolitan areas were all about street photography, architecture, night photography, and city scenes.

In Alaska and Ghost Ranch, I almost exclusively used a 70-200mm lens with assists from a 50mm lens. In NYC, London, and Chicago, I almost literally only used two lenses (mainly a 50mm along with a 24mm lens, and an occasional 35mm lens.)

Story: Route 66 in Oklahoma

DCC members Steve Hawiszcak and Dalis Foglia visited Route 66 in Oklahoma this spring

Route 66 - The Mother Road in America

by Steve Hawiszcak

Route 66 was one of the United States' first continuous stretches of paved highway, and served as a major path for those who migrated to the West.

"The Mother Road" was established on November 11, 1926, and ultimately stretched 2,448 miles from Chicago to Los Angeles. It became the shortest, year-round route between the Midwest and the Pacific Coast, and was also known as "The Main Street of America" and the "Will Rogers Highway". On that date, only 800 miles of Route 66 were paved, the rest being graded dirt, gravel, bricks, or planks of wood. It took 11 more years before the entire road would be paved.

It linked small, rural towns to larger cities, and markets. The fact that it covered mainly flat areas and featured moderate year-round weather made it an attractive route for travelers, and trucks. During this time, it also became one of the key routes for moving military equipment across the country.

ROUTE 66 IN OKLAHOMA CITY

“Oklahoma City looks oh so pretty...”

Greetings, all. Wanna get your kicks on Route 66?

Oklahoma City is the closest point to Dallas on Route 66, and next year being the Centennial of the Mother Road, much attention is turning its way. If you're going to the Ansel Adams exhibition or the club field trip there in August, why not plan to savor the flavor of Route 66?

Some quick background. For newbies to 66, as the song says “it winds from Chicago to LA, more than 2000 miles all the way.” Since 1926, it's been fabled in songs, movies and stories such as “The Grapes of Wrath” (which, by the way, gave it the name “the Mother Road”).

There's probably no comparable corridor of Americana, kitsch and neon to be found anywhere on the planet. To properly see it all would require weeks (if not months), so it's best to limit yourself to short stretches, such as those around Tulsa, Amarillo, or Oklahoma City.

Where do I start? Take a gander at www.travelok.com/route66 for a quick reference. In Oklahoma, Route 66 runs over 400 miles from Baxter Springs, Kansas, to the Texas border, but don't plan to see all of it at one go. It would drive you mad, and that might ruin your pictures. Tulsa has a great parade of neon along 11st Street, but Oklahoma City has more than its share of fun sights.

How do I get there? Drive I-35 into north North Texas (i.e. Oklahoma) and when you see the State Capitol, stop. About three hours for most of us.

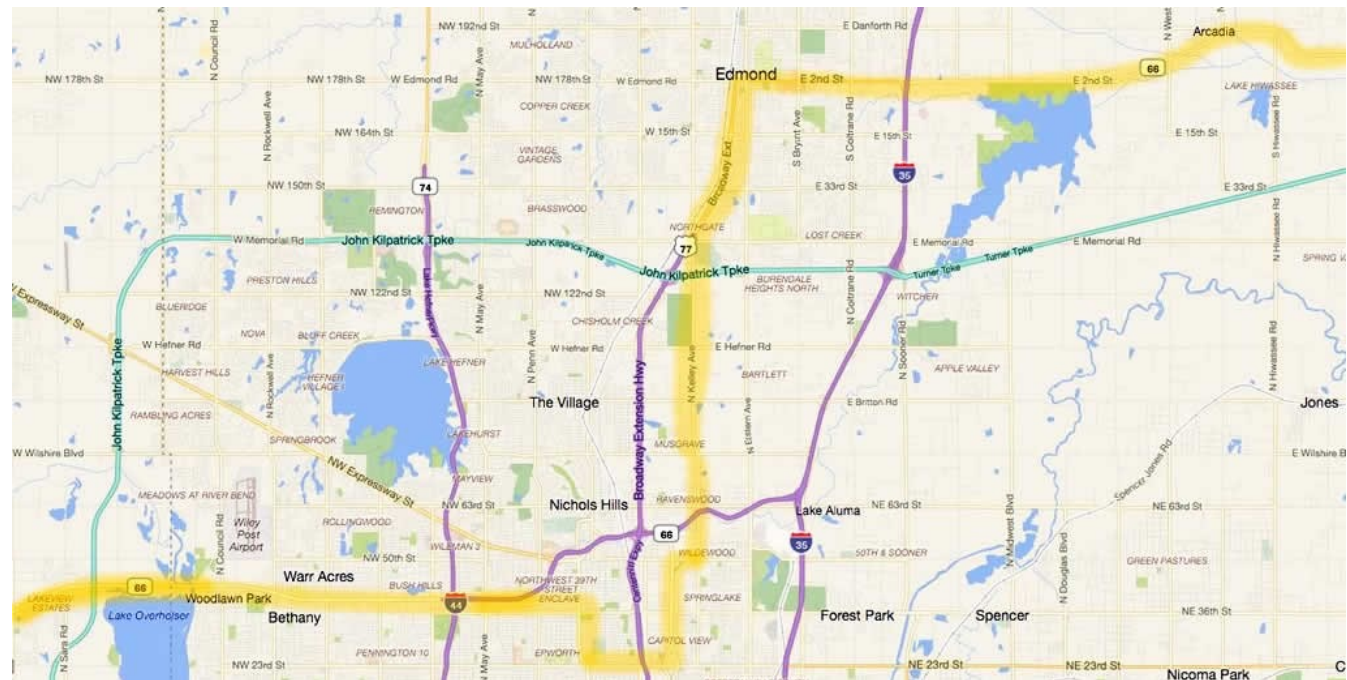
How do I know what to see? Route 66 guidebooks are popping up everywhere. (I like the spiral-bound EZ Route 66 with turn-by-turn directions.) Oklahoma publishes a guide to the entire state that's insanely useful. It's available free at the Oklahoma Welcome Center when you cross the border, or at www.travelok.com/brochures. They also offer a Route 66 Passport with spots for rubber stamps

available at all major (and many minor) roadside attractions. Get them both. It will be worth it.

Another good source is Roadside America (www.roadsideamerica.com). They always have the quirkiest stops for any road trip.

Orientation. Using the typical East-West travel direction, begin in Arcadia, northeast of the city. Old Route 66 (now happily called OK-66) travels west to Edmond, where it turns south (as US-77, then Lincoln Blvd) and heads toward the Capitol. The old route made a fish-hook turn around the Capitol's east, south and west sides, before heading west as 23rd Street. North on Classen Blvd, west on 39th Street, and soon you're back motorin' on OK-66 past Lake Overholser toward Yukon and El Reno.

Confused? Here's a handy map:

Caution: If you plan to travel further afield on Route 66, there are a lot of detours and construction on the route. They're gussying up for the Centennial next year. We experienced a 20-mile detour just east of Arcadia on OK-66 back in June.

1. **The Arcadia Round Barn.** (address: 107 OK-66, www.arcadiaroundbarn.com, free, passport stamp available.) Built in 1898, it was near-on twenty years old when Oklahoma became a state. It's a big round red barn at the south end of town (!), you literally can't miss it.

2. **Pops 66.** (about a mile west at 660 OK-66, www.pops66.com, passport stamp.) Look for the great big (66-foot) neon coke bottle. See it? You're there! Enjoy the walls of sodas in every color or flavor, maybe have a meal. It's a fun stop.

3. **Blue Hippo.** (1129 S. Broadway, Edmond.) Perhaps a lost cousin to the Blue Whale of Catoosa? “Happy” can be found near Tener’s Western Outfitters. Nearby, look for the Scooby-Doo Mystery Machine.

4. **Oklahoma State Capitol.** If you can’t find it, you really aren’t looking too hard. Smack dab in the middle of Oklahoma City, and home to the government of (as some say) “North North Texas”. Open for tours daily, with wonderful architecture and paintings, as well as the state art collection. The passport stamp is in the gift shop, just past security. Visitor parking is to the south.

5. **Tower Theatre.** (425 NW 23rd St, a mile west of the Capitol, www.towertheatreok.com, passport stamp.) Built in 1937, and still hosting live music and movies. A great display of the neon arts after dark.

6. **Milk Bottle Grocery.** (2426 N. Classen Blvd.) A tiny wedge-shaped building with a huge Braum’s milk bottle on its roof. A Route 66 staple since 1948. Look for the Buffalo Goddess mural on its wall.

7. **Oberholser Iron Bridge.** (Northeast corner of Lake Oberholser, over the North Canadian River.) You can see it from OK-66, but will have to find the side route down to the bridge itself. When you do, you can drive across on the original 1926 roadway.

8. **Route 66 Park.** (West side of Lake Oberholser, technically in Yukon.) The park is on the lake and is a nice cool spot on a hot day. Great for the kiddos.

9. **Sid's Diner.** (300 S. Choctaw Ave, El Reno, passport stamp.) About ten miles west of Yukon, but well worth the drive. An old-fashioned diner, and home to the Oklahoma fried onion burger (another Route 66 staple) as well as great shakes. You haven't lived if you haven't been to Sid's. 'Nuff said.

10. **Fort Reno.** (7107 W Cheyenne St, El Reno, www.fortreno.org, closes at 4:00pm, so plan ahead.) 1874 U.S. Army post established to protect the Cheyenne and Arapaho tribes. Also served as a POW camp during World War II (look for the German and Italian soldiers' graves.) Admission includes the US Cavalry Association Museum. Chapel currently closed.

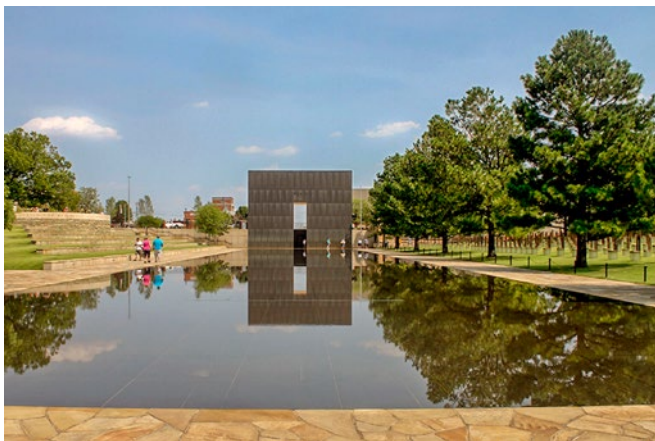
Story: Route 66 in Oklahoma

OTHER SIGHTS IN OKLAHOMA CITY GREAT FOR PHOTOGRAPHERS

Note: Though not on Route 66, most of these have a passport stamp. You just have to ask.

Oklahoma City National Memorial (620 N. Harvey Ave.) Commemorates the 1995 bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building. Worth the trip to OKC, in and of itself. (Both National Parks and OK Route 66 passport stamps available in the museum.)

First Americans Museum (659 First Americans Blvd.) Presents the history and culture of Oklahoma's 39 tribes. Highly recommended.

Oklahoma History Center (800 Nazih Zuhdi Dr.) A great place to learn more about our northern neighbor.

Oklahoma Railway Museum (3400 NE Grand Blvd, free.) Static displays of restored locomotives and rolling stock, with a 19th-century depot.

Note: The nearby **45th Infantry Division Museum** is temporarily closed, and being reorganized as the **Oklahoma National Guard Museum**. Such a shame, as we'll have to wait till next summer. Prior to World War II, the 45th's insignia was a Native American swastika, so it's ironic that they liberated Munich and kept Hitler's personal possessions as war prizes.

Tinker Air Force Base Air Park (next to the I-40 access road at Air Depot Blvd, just outside the checkpoint, free.) Get up-close and personal with about a dozen warbirds on outdoor display, including a B-29, B-47, B-52, B-1 Lancer and Air Force One. Maybe catch their modern cousins taking off overhead.

For the less historically inclined, there are lively dining and shopping districts in Edmond, Uptown 23rd Street, Western Avenue, and Bethany (all on 66). Great places to just wander.

Oh, and if you make a detour on the way up (or back)...

At Chickasaw National Recreation Area (Sulphur, OK), you might get lucky and spot the bison herd. Near dusk is usually a good time to view them. Just keep away from the fencing. (Do not pet the fluffy cows!)

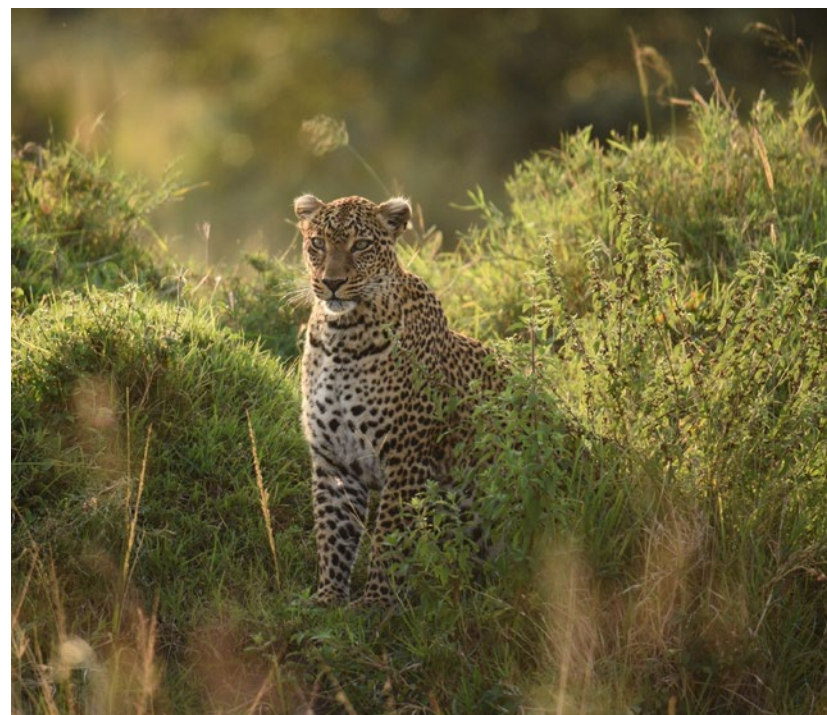

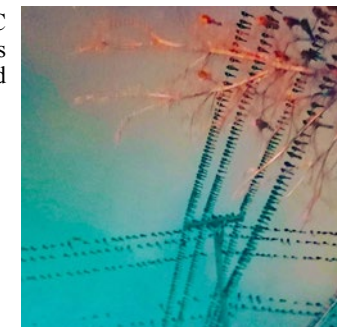

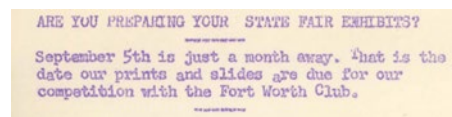

Dallas Camera Club (DCC) was organized in 1934 by 52 printmakers meeting twice a month to improve their photographic skills. Color slides were added, presumably in the 1940s, and color print competitions were added in 1970. In 1998, images from digital files were first accepted into DCC competitions. In 2005, slides were combined with projected digital images to create the projected images category. Slides were eliminated in 2008. Club competitions are now focused on color prints, monochrome prints and digital projected images.


The objective of the club is “the mutual entertainment and education of its members in all forms of amateur photographic art.” The DCC hosts contests and events including monthly competitions, field trips, workshops, programs of general interest, an awards banquet and an annual competition (the “Bird”) between DCC and Fort Worth Camera Club members. Looking Back: August, 2011



Competition Topics for 2011— 2012

August, 2011 Junk: This topic is of objects you might find strewn to the side of the road for trash pick up. Old objects that no longer have value as found in a junk yard. Old dilapidated cars, trains or other non-working or undesirable items; large or small.	December, 2011 Negative Space: In contrast to what most books may say about proper composition, in this topic the photographer should think outside the norm and create a dynamic image where the subject is a small part of the image and the majority of the image contains negative space. (Negative space is the space around and between the main subject (s) of an image.)	Emotion: This is an image of a person or people that exhibits an emotion on their faces. Joyful, anguished, tearful and surprised are just a few examples.
