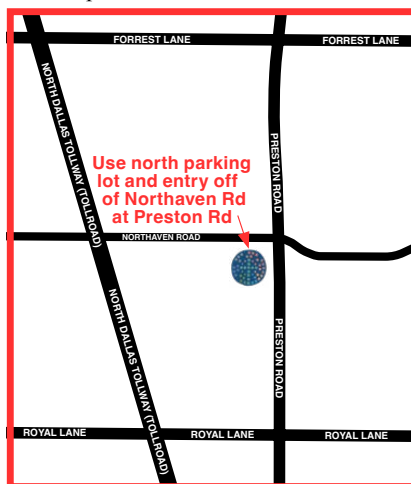

In the early hours of the morning, the master of ceremonies calls out instructions, bringing the tae kwan do martial arts trials to order. The students eagerly rush to their positions, faces beaming, ready to prove their mettle. On command, they swirl, kick, punch and dance their way around the floor. After the opening demonstrations, the trials begin. The students pair up and demonstrate their skill in self-defense. While the younger students carefully mock-battle each other in their traditional doboks, the more advanced students are noticeably armored in face shields and padded gear.

The next round of demonstrations involves breaking wooden boards with punches and kicks. The students gingerly test the sweet spot on the board that they aim to hit. Several aides hold the boards and brace for impact. The student on trial develops a deep look of concentration. Yelling, they spin and kick the board, foot crashing through the shards, as the aides behind try not to get hurt. Then they punch the remaining board with the chi their master has taught them. Sometimes the younger students have difficulty with this task, so the master of ceremonies and other judges gently coach them.

The final demonstration involves prowess with weapons. This is a solo effort, where the student swings and slices with facsimile sharp blades. Afterwards, a special part of the program honors the Silver Dragons, parents and grandparents of the students who decided to take up martial arts practice. They demonstrate self-defense techniques with a partner and exemplify how it is never too late to learn a new skill. Smiling, their family members come to stand beside them while the honors are bestowed.

Finally, the trials are finished. The students line up in several rows. The master of ceremonies calls out each level of belt, and the students run to the judge's bench. With their supportive family standing behind them, each student is awarded the next degree. One family member declares their support and how proud they are of their child (or spouse). Happy, smiling faces all around. The cycle continues for another year.

The June field trip led us to Denison to capture the Legends Martial Arts testing day. Over 80 students tested that day. It was a broad group encompassing those testing for the first time to black belt testing. The students ranged from youngsters to the “Silver Dragons” group.

The testing is a physical demonstration of four skills in front of certified judges. The first of these skills is forms, a preset combination of defensive and offensive movements against imaginary opponents. Training for this skill is structured to develop left and right body balance. The next skill, sparring, practices techniques against real opponents. Weaponry demonstrated the training with jahng bong (a bow staff) and ssang jeol bong (nunchaku). The most dramatic skill, board breaking, demonstrates the focus, power, and accuracy of strikes.

The testing revealed a high level of discipline; however, instructors and judges demonstrated mentorship, compassion, and encouragement. The successes experienced by the students were heart felt.

After the testing was the belt Ceremony. Students are called forward and the instructor hands them their new belt. The old belt is removed and replaced by the new belt. This is followed by the belt tying ritual where the instructor completes the knot, symbolizing their shared bond and the student’s readiness to learn.

The entire group was eager to pose for a photo; their smiling and beaming faces an indication of their pride for jobs well done!

While the indoor lighting and hues from the highly polished gym floor and central bright yellow logo posed some photographic challenges, the warm reception from Legends Martial Arts was appreciated!

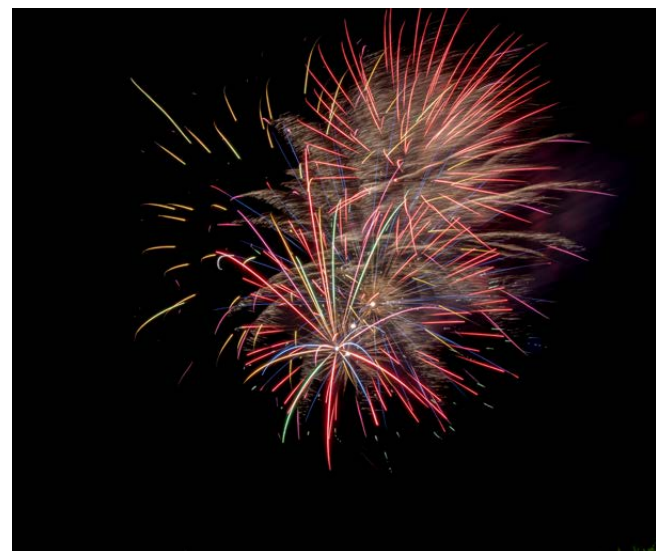

There is a 25 person limit to this field trip. Reservations must be made in advance.

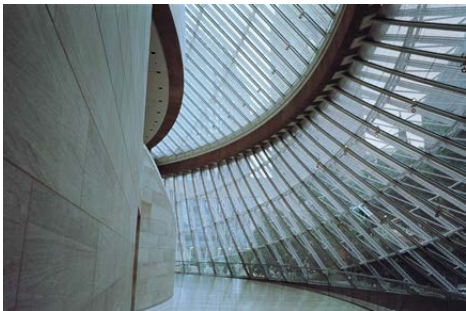
There will be a charge per member. The total will be determined by the final total of members in attendance. It will be no more than \$25.00 each, and most likely closer to \$10 - \$15 each.

We will meet at 10:00 AM. Members may photograph the lobby and Loge area, but the symphony music hall is closed.

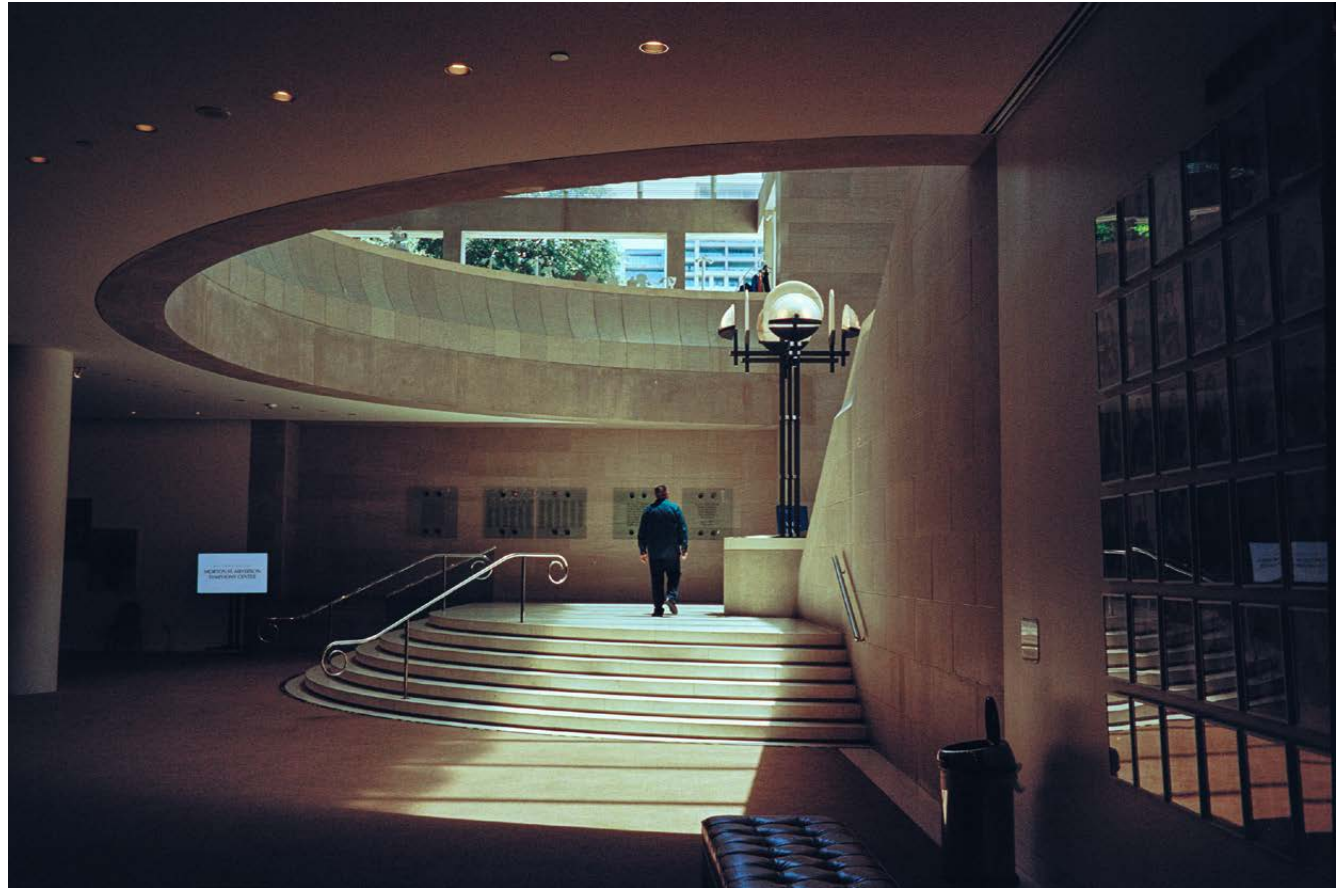

Past Program: Laura Wilson - June 23, 2026

Wilson addressed a joint session of the Dallas Camera Club and the Plano Photography Clubs

Laura Wilson's Background and Program

Laura was born and raised in a suburb outside Boston in a family that valued art. In college she majored in painting. Fast forwarding to her marriage, she and her husband produced three sons. An interesting aside is that these sons became well-known actors. With her having three active sons Laura quickly learned that painting took up much time, so she picked up a camera as an artistic outlet. Because of her background in painting, photography was quite natural, because she was already familiar with the ideas of elements of design, composition, and color.

In 1965 she and her husband moved to Dallas, where her husband took a position as the head of KERA. Years later she met world-renown photographer Richard Avedon who was known for his fashion photography. By then he had taken on the assignment to photograph people in the American West, based on a commission from the Amon Carter Museum. On a lark Laura applied for a job to work as his assistant. Their first work together involved going to Sweetwater Texas to photograph a rattlesnake roundup. During her work (1979-1986) with Avedon, they photographed in seventeen states in the American West. Her job as his assistant was to find interesting subjects outside the mainstream for him to photograph with his 8x10 camera. She found these people in state fairs, rodeos, carnivals, coal mines, oil fields, slaughterhouses, and prisons. While working for Avedon, her own photography was developing as well.

The major influences on her photography were Henri Cartier-Bresson, Robert Capa, Robert Frank, and Richard Avedon. The common denominator with all these artists was their focus on photographing people, although the types of people, and the setting were quite varied. These photographers she most admired could be described by a variety of words, such as street photographers, photojournalists, documentary photographers and portraitists. Those words also described much of Laura Wilson's photography.

Laura Wilson is the author of eight books in photography. Her best-known book is *Avedon at Work: In the American West*, which was her documenting the famous photographer's six year journey in the American West. Her last two published books were within the last four years. One was a collection of portraits of famous authors, and the other was based on her photography in Mexico.

About the program itself, thanks to Don Haig's ingenuity, slightly more than 100 chairs were in the room and the attendance was estimated to be about 90. Since the camera club's move to the Northaven Church, this was the largest attendance for any meeting.

There are three aspects on which all programs can be evaluated: How did the presenter come across in their presentation? How well did they connect to the audience? Did people learn very much from the program?

Laura Wilson was an excellent presenter. Not only did she have a quick wit about her, but she was able to hold an audience. She was described by various people in the audience as personable, charming, and one who very easily connected with her audience. Her program was very well organized, and the highlight of program was her outstanding ability to tell stories behind her photos, which made for a highly educational program. She came across as being a very hard working, persevering, highly energetic person, which was noted by many in her audience. One participant in the audience even commented that he could see why she was so successful in her career, in part because of her work ethic. A nice summary of thoughts about her as a presenter was the following: "I thoroughly enjoyed listening to an icon."

When one wants to become better at anything, one of the main teaching tools is to "get in the kitchen" with people who are accomplished at whatever it is that you wish to learn. This is one of the main purposes of having programs in the camera club. There is much to be learned by seeing the photographs and listening to presenters tell the stories behind their photographs. Laura Wilson was an excellent teacher.

Like all presenters she was asked what she was most pleased with and/or proud of with her photography. Her answer was that she "still had the energy to further pursue new projects in photography." Keep in mind, this is someone who has already produced nine books of her photography!

At the end of her presentation, she willingly answered all questions asked of her. So often times the question comes up at programs about the photographer's equipment. Her answer was a Nikon D850 with two lenses (24-70mm and 105mm). After disclosing that information, she added that the equipment she utilized was not all that important to her. It was just equipment to her.

Education and Experience

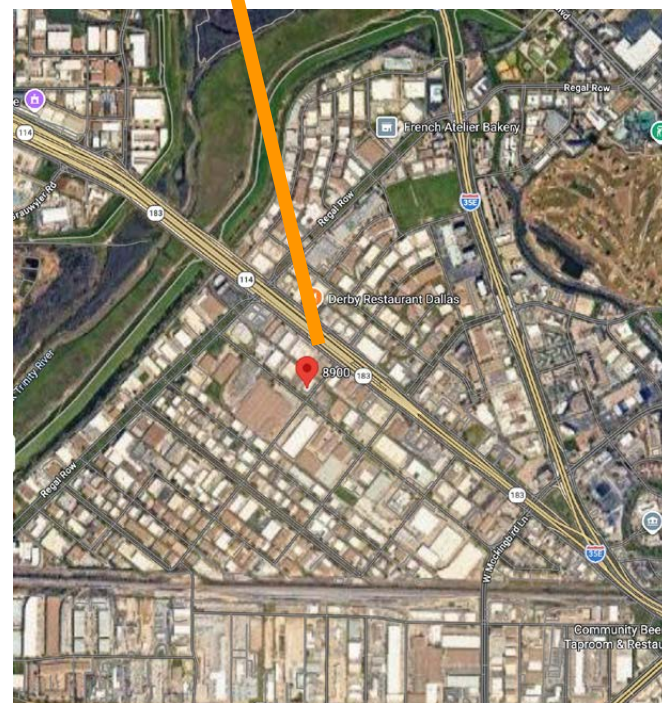

I retired from a professional classical ballet dance career in 1996 having danced in companies in the U.S. and Brazil. After retiring from my dance career, I worked for Rolex Watch Repair service here in Dallas until my retirement 25 years later.

Just before retirement from that career, I began my serious photography pursuit and have since found my niche in dance performance photography.

Photographing dance performance is not just about trying to get them in focus, having good composition and freezing their movements as in sports photography, but catching them in the proper dance positions, character and artistic interpretation as intended by the choreographer that shows them in their most flattering moments.

In sports photography, no one cares if the athlete has straight legs and pointed feet when he performs his game winning catch or home run.

Photographing dance that tells a story must capture the personality of the character as well as the positions and movement created by the choreographer. An example would be the exotic and mysterious Arabian Dancer, or the enigmatic personality of Herr Drosselmeyer in The Nutcracker, or the comedic stepsister in Cinderella.

Dallas Camera Club (DCC) was organized in 1934 by 52 printmakers meeting twice a month to improve their photographic skills. Color slides were added, presumably in the 1940s, and color print competitions were added in 1970. In 1998, images from digital files were first accepted into DCC competitions. In 2005, slides were combined with projected digital images to create the projected images category. Slides were eliminated in 2008. Club competitions are now focused on color prints, monochrome prints and digital projected images.

The objective of the club is "the mutual entertainment and education of its members in all forms of amateur photographic art." The DCC hosts contests and events including monthly competitions, field trips, workshops, programs of general interest, an awards banquet and an annual competition (the "Bird") between DCC and Fort Worth Camera Club members. The DCC emphasizes intra-club competition as a learning process. Importance is placed on helping the beginner or new member feel at ease, ask questions, learn and participate.
