There is a *Lightroom* feature I just discovered – and it is just amazing what it can do. If you already know about it and use this feature, then why didn't you tell everyone about it, especially, me? It will be revealed soon so be patient. This is a *Treasure Hunt*, after all.

The number of images taken on a vacation, field trip or while working on a project can number in the hundreds, sometimes over a 1000. It is often daunting to sit at the computer and edit these images, no matter how wonderful they are (or will be after editing). The time it takes just to view all of them and delete the really bad ones is guite substantial; the time it takes to edit each image using the **Basic Panel** in Lightroom can take hours, days or weeks. On occasion the time needed to edit new images is so great that beginning the editing process becomes a deterrent to ever starting. The set of new images may sit for a long time before necessity or guilt motivates the photographer to do what is required to

make an image into a creation.

Photographers who edit his or her own images devote a lot of time and energy analyzing each one and applying the

sions; rather, they want to make each adjustment he or she believes to be the best to enhance an image. In *Lightroom* there has existed a way that



combination of adjustments in the main panel in *Lightroom*, the **Basic Panel**, to bring out the best features of an image. Those who are the most compulsive do this one image at a time such that all of the potential adjustment in Lightroom's Basic Panel are moved individually to develop the image into the photographer's previsualization of what was conceived in the field.

Many photographers do not want the computer to make any editing deci-

most editors, even beginning ones, know: the **Auto** button within the **Basic Panel** in the **Develop** module. One click and *Lightroom* analyses the image for its unique properties and sets the Exposure, Contrast, Highlight, Shadow, White, Black, Clarity, Vibrance and Saturation sliders to positions *Lightroom's* algorithm determines would be "best".

When editors choose to use this feature, for many, if not most, it is a <u>starting</u> point for additional editing. (Continued on page 5)

Sometime the Auto feature does a better job than the editor could do and nothing additional needs to be done; however, there is always something more that *could* be done to enhance an image including **Resetting** all of the sliders to their beginning position and reediting the image.


If you can accept that there is a place for using the **Auto** feature in the **Basic Panel** within *Lightroom's* **Develop** module, then you are prepared to discover the **Treasure**.

What if you could have every image in a set of images, each individually edited, uniquely for the image's qualities, with about 4 clicks of a mouse? That could be hundreds of images edited almost instantly! Now, wouldn't that be a Treasure? NOW, WOULDN'T THAT BE A TREASURE?

You can do it so easily that it is difficult to understand why everyone does not know of this Treasure. But you will – now.

Here is the Treasure

Use Ctrl A to select **all** of the images in a group of images that are in the Library Module or the Develop Module (film strip of images at the bottom of the Lightroom Screen). Alternately, images may be selected by clicking on one image and Shift Clicking on another image distant from the first to include this Range of images. Also,



Ctrl Clicking separate images to select them would work, too. [Notice that the **Previous**



button changes to **Sync...** when more than one images is selected.]

Move the small, white, almost insignificantly looking rectangular switch just to the left of the Sync... button UP to Turn ON the Auto Sync feature. The word Sync... changes to Auto Sync.

Next, Click on Auto in the second

section of the **Basic Panel** to make the magic happen. In an instant, well, maybe a second or two depending on the number of images in your selection, ALL of the selected images are Auto Toned! All of them.

BE SURE TO TURN **OFF** THER **AUTO SYNC** BUTTON BY MOVING IT **DOWWARD** AS IT WAS BE-FORE YOUR EMPLIMENTED THE TREASURE.

That's it. This feature will permit an editor to do in seconds that which would require hours or days to accomplish. As each image is later reviewed further editing can be done, if necessary. The other panels which provide other editing features can be accessed and used, of course.







September Field Trip - Mt. Elbert, Colorado

DALLAS CAMERA CLUB FIELD TRIP SEPTEMBER 16-19, 2019

September is the best time to experience the clean crisp air, mountains, streams and the beautiful sunlight of the Colorado Rockies. Mt. Elbert Lodge is in central Colorado at 9,700 feet in elevation. It's located 2 hours SW of Denver in a small town called Twin Lakes. It is 30 miles SW of Leadville, 30 miles east of Aspen and 30 miles north of Buena Vista. Driving distance from Dallas is 795 miles or 13-14 hours. Airline service is available into Aspen, Colorado Springs and Denver. The drive from Denver and Colorado Springs is about 2 1/2 hours. The lodge sits at the base of Mt. Elbert , the highest point in Colorado. In addition to magnificent stands of aspen trees (the fall color should be at peak), places of visual interest include Maroon Bells, Independence Pass, Twin Lakes, the Leadville Train and the John Denver sanctuary among others. There is also hiking and white water rafting. The entire area is mountainous and scenic. There are eateries nearby in Twin Lakes and Granite, and the cabins have kitchens.

The lodge is offering us a package that includes a private bedroom, 3 break-

fasts and 3 dinners for approximately we \$285 per person or \$570 per couple, sit including tax. Each person should is make their own reservation, and be sure to mention it's for the Dallas Camera Club. If you are traveling with someone, it should be mentioned so rooms or cabins can be reserved together. A down payment of \$90 per person is needed. The cancellation policy is liberal. Q & A - Photographic Questions

Q & A – Questions Members Ask

This column has been created in the TTL to be a site for questions, relating to Photography, to be asked and answered. We all have questions large and small, simple and complex. The Internet and, especially, YouTube can be a lush resource; however, many answers to our questions can be answered by the knowledgeable members of the DCC.

When switching out of *Auto* to Shutter or Aperture priority is there any other settings that are useful?

Today's cameras are very sophisticated and have programed into them algorithms that evaluate a scene and adjust the camera's setting to arrive at a "best" aperture, shutter speed and ISO. There is nothing wrong with using the camera's "intelligence" to expose an image; however, the photographer loses a lot of creativity.

If the intent of the photographer's image capture is to stop action, increase or decrease the depth of field, then the Auto setting could easily conflict with the original concept of the potential image. That is the time to set the camera on Shutter or Aperture priority setting and let the camera make the complementary setting to get an exposure. Taken to the extreme, setting of the camera to Manual will allow the



photographer to manage every aspect of the exposure.

Still, there are instances when using Shutter or Aperture priority will not obtain a good exposure because the photographer chose a setting that results in unintentional under or over exposure. This happens, if the ISO settings were not adjusted to an opti-

complementary setting to get an expo- mal value when not in *Auto* mode.

This can be easily corrected, though, perhaps the setting are not widely known or used: set the camera independently for *Auto ISO*. The Menu must be entered and the *Auto ISO* setting be turned **on**. This setting can be controlled by limits, both high and low, that prohibit the ISO from exceeding the parameters set by the photographer. When an aperture or shutter speed would not result in a good exposure, the camera's ISO will be automatically adjusted so that a good exposure will be applied.

Remember to turn **off** this feature when it is not needed.


May Guest Speaker - Ashley Landis


The Dallas Morning News in December 2014, and has been covering sports at all levels, major news stories, and so much more.





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
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Best Views of the Trinity River

Location 1 Upper and Lower Chain of Wetlands Take I-45 South to Loop 12 East; go 1/16 of a mile; look for the bridge on the left to enter the wetland area.

Wetlands construction for the Trinity River Corridor Project is underway and will improve floodwater conveyance and benefit wildlife. When completed, seven wetland cells will make up the 170-acre Chain of Wetlands extending four miles from Cedar Creek to Loop 12

Location 2 Trinity River Audubon Center 6500 South Loop 12 Dallas, Texas 75217

The Trinity River Audubon Center is only a few miles from downtown Dallas. The center is the flagship for Audubon's education initiatives in Texas and is designated a "green" building for energy conservation and sustainability. Exhibits feature ecological and cultural themes and provide direct access to nature viewing, hiking, picnicking and canoeing.

Location 3 Trinity Overlook no W. Commerce St. (at Beckley) Dallas, Texas 75209

Attractive signage at the Trinity Overlook provides information on the Trinity River Corridor Project, the Trinity Lakes Park and the two bridges - the Margaret Hunt Hill and Margaret McDermont - designed by renowned architect and engineer Santiago Calatrava. Location 4 Great Trinity Forest 3000 Municipal Dallas, Texas 75215 or 7000 Bexar Street

Dallas, Texas 75215

The 6,000 acre Great Trinity Forest is the largest urban bottomland, hardwood forest in the United States. It contains a collection of more than 70 "trophy trees".

Location 5 Margaret Hunt Hill Construction Beckley@Continental Avenue Bridge

Construction is now underway for the Margaret Hunt Hill Bridge the first major signature bridge to be constructed across the Trinity River Corridor. The bridge and will link West Dallas and North Oak Cliff with downtown Dallas. The bridge will span Industrial Boulevard and connect to Woodall Rodgers over I-35. The bridge is projected for completion in mid-2011.

Location 6 Trinity River Trammel Crow Park 3700 Sylvan Avenue Dallas, Texas 75207 (River access at boat launch)

The Trinity River is 715 miles long and is the largest river basin that begins and ends Texas. This natural resource sits in the center of downtown Dallas.
