


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Fellow of the Dallas Camera Club (FDCC) Active Members

May Field Trip Report: Texas Rose Horse Park

The wake-up alarm came early Saturday (May 18th) morning. With a nearly two-hour drive to Tyler ahead, a cup of coffee and a protein bar were rapidly consumed. Driving into the morning glare of the sun, we sped east past Buc-ee's on I-20 at Terrell into the verdant landscape of East Texas.

Upon arriving at the Texas Rose Horse Park (thanks to Larry Golden for the suggestion), we parked and started seeing other DCC members already on site. Approximately 17 stalwart photographers participated in a great day of shooting. We enjoyed a sunny day photographing horses with and without riders, dogs, and tack (that's what they call the stuff you need to ride a horse like saddles and bridles).

The horse park is a sprawling complex with at least six show rings, barns, and pastures. There was constant activity throughout the day. I shot over 2600 frames (using the burst mode is essential for capturing peak action in moving subjects. As of this writing, I have pared it down to 121 files to work on.) For lunch, many of us took advantage of the onsite food trailer featuring Mexican food and burgers (kind of slow but very good and satisfying).

Since I had never been to this venue nor photographed a horse show jumping event, I wasn't sure what to expect. Now that we have done it once, I think this will for sure be added to the club field trip rotation. It is very accessible, fun, and provides ample opportunities for taking photographs no matter what your preferences are.

The Aurora in Wyoming

I was visiting my 25 year old niece and we had just finished a wonderful day in Rocky Mountain National Park. We were leaving the park and heading to Boulder, CO for a relaxing dinner.

But around 9 pm we got a text from my husband Robert (in Dallas) telling us the northern lights were going to be visible in Wyoming. There was no question. We had to go for it. So with Taylor Swift on the playlist we skipped dinner, grabbed snacks and caffeine from a nearby grocery store and started driving.

After a winding drive through the mountains, we made it to Cheyenne, Wyoming around midnight. Absolutely no sign of the aurora so we decided to head east toward Curt Gowdy State Park.

About 10 miles outside of Cheyenne we were rewarded with our first sight of the lights. While Taylor was singing You Belong With Me, we jumped out of our rented Jeep and started taking pictures.

Unfortunately, I didn't have my tripod so we used what we could to stabilize the camera. We spent the next 4 hours driving along Wyoming Highway 210 enjoying the lights and trying to improvise some good photos. Most of the images were taken around Happy Jack, Wyoming and Medicine Bow National Forest

The Aurora in the Lower 48

On the night of Friday, May 10 something extraordinary happened in our skies - practically everyone's skies, at least in the United States. At least five coronal mass ejections (solar storms) slammed into our atmosphere creating aurora borealis displays as far south as Galveston and Puerto Rico. This G5 solar storm is the first since 2003. Power grid operators were on edge, but photographers took to the road to see what they could capture.

Why does this happen? The Sun emits electrically-charged ions, which move away from the Sun in a stream of plasma (ionized gas) known as the solar wind. As the plasma comes in contact with the Earth's magnetic field, the ions are agitated into moving around the Earth. Some of the ions become trapped and will consequently interact with the Earth's ionosphere (an average of 60-80 miles above the surface), causing the ions to glow. This is the same principal as how a neon sign lights up. As electrons pass through the neon tubing, they glow, thus producing the light in a neon sign.

The colors in the aurora depend on the gasses and height of the atmosphere where the aurora is occurring. Different gasses are prevalent at different heights. This chart explains the colors at different heights.

Storyboard: *Make the Best of What You Got* Don't sweat the small stuff!

I found a great video by Lee Hoy on YouTube the other day, It was all about taking what nature gives you. It really hit home and I want to share some of what he said with you.

Lee is an OM System Ambassador and the senior photography workshop instructor for Wildside Nature Tours. He began by saying that he's seen many participants let the shots they missed ruin the whole day, or even the whole workshop. They go out having hung their hopes on getting "the shot." Maybe is is a particular species of bird or animal, and when that doesn't pan out they are so disappointed that they ignore all the great stuff they did get, dwelling on the fact that "the shot" didn't materialize.

That reminded me of my last trip to Kenya. I so wanted a shot of a cheetah in beautiful golden light. I got some wonderful images of the wildebeest migration, lion cubs, lilac breasted rollers, and even a couple of lilac breasted rollers on a wildebeest's back. I also got a nice image of a cheetah in tall grass. But I dislocated my hip, and while I was in the hospital, the rest of the group got a cheetah in that beautiful golden light. I was soooo disappointed.

I have since learned to take what nature gives me and not stress over what I miss and not to compare what I get to other photographers. And I've learned to appreciate the wonderful cheetah image I did get, shown above. Let me share some of the pearls of wisdom that Lee included in his video. Taking what nature gives you means:

- Understanding that you shouldn't "impose your photographic will on nature." If it's the middle of winter, and you want to shoot eagles at White Rock Lake, but they don't happen to be there when you arrive. Change your expectations. Don't let it ruin your day. Look around. Maybe the pelicans or snow geese would make a good subject. Do you see any nice macro shots?

- Accepting that challenging weather often provides some of the best photographic opportunities. Work with nature instead of against it. If nature gives you a storm instead of a sunset, take advantage of it rather than trying to make nature fit your expectations. Stop going against it - nature always wins.

- Delighting in the present. One of the most important qualities a nature photographer can possess is gratefulness. We are so privileged to be able to live here and have the freedom and resources to capture the world around us.

- Taking advantage of cooperative subjects. Some animals are more comfortable around people than others. When you find an animal who is cooperative, work it, baby, work it! Shoot side light, back light, close-ups and some from farther back, verticals and horizontals.

- Working with the light rather than fighting it. If your subject is backlit, and you know that moving around will spook it, use the backlight.

- Being patient. That brought to mind shooting at Hanalei Bay one misty morning last December. We waited and waited to catch a rainbow - the conditions were right, but it just wasn't happening. I got antsy and decided to head back down to the car. I was walking down the beach and stopped to talk to a local photographer for a while. All of a sudden I noticed a flash of color out of the corner of my eye. The most brilliant double rainbow sat over a surf lit by the early morning sunshine. If I hadn't stopped to talk, I would have missed it!

- Reducing frustration and setting yourself up for success. Master your camera system. Develop your fieldcraft. Know what ISO and shutter speed you need for the situation. Learn to recognize when your surroundings will make a great image. Don't get frustrated if things don't work out. Frustration just takes the joy out of the trip - for you and for your companions. Trust Lee (and me) you are going to miss more shots than you get, and that's OK.

Revel in the images you love and don't sweat the small stuff!




Texas Photographic Society 36th Annual Member Show

A Bit of Surrealism

on exhibit at PDNB Gallery thru June 15, 2024

PDNB will be adding a small show, *A Bit of Surrealism* that will start the celebration of the 100th year of Surrealism by profiling a couple of peculiar artists: Angus McBean (1904 – 1990, British) and Alfred Gescheidt (1926 – 2012, American).

Angus McBean (1904 – 1990, British) was known for his theater portraits from the British stage including the Old Vic and the Royal Shakespeare Company. He often incorporated surrealism in his portraiture. He was a pioneer of surrealist photography working with photo montage and multiple exposures. The Harvard Library holds his archive in their extensive Theatre Collection.

Alfred Gescheidt (1926 – 2012, American) was a street photographer, often experimenting in photo collage. The images were humorous, influenced by surrealism. One of the picture editors at The New York Times, John Durniak, called him the Charlie Chaplin of the camera.



Dallas Camera Club (DCC) was organized in 1934 by 52 printmakers meeting twice a month to improve their photographic skills. Color slides were added, presumably in the 1940s, and color print competitions were added in 1970. In 1998, images from digital files were first accepted into DCC competitions. In 2005, slides were combined with projected digital images to create the projected images category. Slides were eliminated in 2008. Club competitions are now focused on color prints, monochrome prints and digital projected images.

The objective of the club is "the mutual entertainment and education of its members in all forms of amateur photographic art." The DCC hosts contests and events including monthly competitions, field trips, workshops, programs of general interest, an awards banquet and an annual competition (the "Bird") between DCC and Fort Worth Camera Club members. The DCC emphasizes intra-club competition as a learning process. Importance is placed on helping the beginner or new member feel at ease, ask questions, learn and participate.






