


One of my earliest attempts, taken from the top of the UT Tower.

Miranda Sensorex 1970

My first serious camera was a Miranda Sensorex.

Miranda was one of the first Japanese companies to manufacture an SLR. They didn't make lenses.

It came with a 50 mm, f/1.9 NIKKOR lens.

Miranda couldn't keep up with rapidly changing technology and went out of business in 1978.










Nikon FE 1983

- 35-200 mm macro zoom




There are two broad types of Still Life...

- Found still life photographs are images of objects that haven't been moved in any way by the photographer.
- Created still life photographs are pictures of objects that are assembled in a visually pleasing manner by the photographer.

Good lighting is critical in both cases. It is more easily achieved in created still life images.




Simplicity can be defined as the photographic equivalent of minimalism.






