The BIRD Competition

Dallas Camera Club Took Home the BIRD!



The *Emily Guthrie Smith Award*, affectionately referred to as "*The BIRD*", competition has been held each year since 1964 between the Dallas Camera Club and Fort Worth Camera Club

Despite the name, the contest is not about bird photography. The competition began when Emily Guthrie Smith suggested that an annual contest would be fun for both clubs. Smith was a Fort Worth native and nationally known artist and teacher. Her

works are in private collections, museums and the Archives of American Artists in the Smithsonian Institution.

She donated and carved the trophy, above, a wood sculpture engraved with the winning club's name, but the reason she chose a bird is not known.

The *BIRD* is a perpetual trophy that has each year's winner's name engraved on it. The competition is held in October or early November and rotated between the clubs each year. This is a great opportunity to meet our neighbor photographers.

Each club submits 15 color or monochrome prints and 15 projected images to be judged real-time at the meeting by a panel of judges. The club with the most points wins and will get to keep the trophy, affectionately known as "The BIRD" for the next year.

The 2025 competition was held at the Dallas Camera Club location on Tuesday, October 28. And the *BIRD* was awarded to the Dallas Camera Club who won by 11 points.

Dallas President, Dennis Fritsche accepted the BIRD from Fort Worth Camera Club President, Bill Chandler.

The Print Competition final score was FWCC=160 / DCC=178
The Digital Competition final score was FWCC=171 / DCC=164
The final overall score totals... FWCC=331 / DCC=342

Besides winning the overall contest, ALL of the images that placed 1st through HM, in both competitions, were from DCC!



FIELD TRIP REPORT: Red Seagall Cowboy Gathering

Saturday morning I got up, made a cup of coffee, emptied nearly 3 inches of water out of my rain gauge, and headed west to Ft. Worth. The closer we got to the Stockvards the brighter it got. Soon there was blue sky and sunshine. After replacing a corrupted card in my camera, I began a very enjoyable morning of photography. The chuckwagon campfires were blazing away and the smell of wood smoke filled the air. All of the competitors were busy preparing their contest entries of beans, Swiss Steak, biscuits, and peach cobbler/pie. Steaming black coffee was poured with gusto. At first, the brilliance of the morning sunlight caused contrasty conditions and difficult exposures but as the clouds began to roll back in, the light evened out and made for great photography.

Our small group gathered near the end of East Exchange Ave., in front of Riscky's BBQ, for the Longhorn cattle drive before going in for a well-earned lunch. Following our group meal, I decided to buy my ticket to the Ranch Rodeo matinee. I had previously checked the Red Steagall Cowboy Gathering website for ticket and photography information but put off buying a ticket online because of potential weather issues. I didn't find anything about taking pictures, so I sent an email inquiry to the organizers asking about camera and received no reply. When I went up the ticket window I held up both cameras and said I wanted a good seat from which to photograph. I was sold a ticket, then proceeded to the Cowtown Coliseum and had my ticket scanned and was admitted with two cameras and long lenses hanging around my neck. It was when I started up the stairs to take my seat that I was stopped and told that I could not take pictures. I said, "Okay" but I wanted my money back. The usher said that she would go get someone to help me. When she returned another young woman asked to accompany her back to the ticket booth where she had me wait in line while she disappeared, supposedly to inform the cashiers that I was coming for my refund. When I got to the window, I explained why I was there and in return was told that there were no refunds and handed a card with contact information if I wished to continue in the rat maze. Which I did to no avail! No refund, no rodeo for me. Oh well.

WHAT: DCC Caddo Lake Fall Color

WHERE: Caddo Lake, Uncertain, TX

WHEN: Friday, November 7 - Sunday, November 9, 2025

The Dallas Camera Club is going to Caddo Lake this year for its annual Fall Color field trip. It has been almost 10 years since the club last visited Caddo Lake, so many members may not be familiar with the lake. Here is a short introduction. For more details, see the links at the end of this article.

Caddo Lake is one of Texas' few natural lakes. Some say the only one. It is also one of 27 wetlands in the US recognized by Ramsar Convention. Lodging and boat rentals are centered around the tiny town of Uncertain, Texas, population less than 100. Caddo Lake is on the Texas-Louisiana border about 3 hours east of Dallas. It has diverse aquatic plant life and wildlife in a bald cypress swamp with a bottomland hardwood forest. It is home to 190 species of trees and shrubs, 22 species of amphibians, 47 mammal species and more than 220 kinds of birds. Over 40 of the native bird species are endangered. Here are a few photos from around the lake.



LOCATION:

The red arrow on the map below points to Caddo Lake. Uncertain, Tx will be our destination to get to Caddo. It is 170 miles from Dallas taking I20 and it takes about 3 hours to get there.



Fall color is becoming a really big deal at Caddo with photographers coming from all over the US. Groups are already booking lodging and boats.

The club has booked 3 boats which will hold a total of 22 photographers. These boats will be available for all 4 scheduled cruises on a first come basis. If the need exists, we will try to find more boats. The boats are 20', 22' and 24' pontoon boats. Boats will all leave from, or near to, the Johnson Ranch Marina.

There are only two small motels in Uncertain which describe themselves as lodges, inns or resorts - the Uncertain Lodge and Inn, and the Shady Glade Resort. There are a few 2 to 5 unit "motels" as well. The State Park also has cabins and campgrounds (these can only be booked 5 months in advance). Other cabins and houses in town are available as well. You will need to make you own arrangements for your party.

Our field trip revolves around photo boat cruises at sunrise (6:40 am) and sunset (5:20 pm). The big picture plan is below. We will put times on these activities as we get closer to the field trip.



The area around Uncertain is shown in more detail below. The main objective is photographing from a boat out on the lake. There are other interesting things around Uncertain to checkout during the day on Saturday or coming or going. These include canoeing or kayaking on the lake, the shoreline around Uncertain, Caddo Lake State Park, Caddo Lake State Wildlife Management Area, Caddo Lake National Wildlife Refuge, and Jefferson, TX.



We will have dinner at the Big Pines Lodge just outside of Uncertain on Saturday evening after the sunset photo cruise.



Biennial Global Photographic Union (GPU) photo festival in Krakow, Poland

Stephen Evans: GPU Photo Festival in Poland

This summer we attended the Biennial Global Photographic Union (GPU) photo festival in Krakow, Poland. There is archeological evidence for settlements in the Krakow area back to the Stone Age and historical records that date back to the 4th century. By the 10th century, Krakow had become a leading trade center and was the capital of Poland from 1038 to 1596. The heart of the city was in the current Old Town district which included Wavel Castle where the rulers lived. During World War II, the Nazis established their "General Government" of Poland in Krakow. The General Government led by Hans Frank first established a Jewish ghetto in 1941 across the river from Old Town to isolate the Jews and then built Auschwitz and Birkenau as concentration and extermination camps. During the photo festival, we had photo shoots in Old Town, the Jewish Quarter, and the Podgórze district (location of the Jewish ghetto). We also traveled to 3 sites within 60 miles of Krakow including Auschwitz and Birkenau extermination camps, Wieliczka Salt Mine, and Zalipie, a rural village.

Old Town in Krakow is about two square miles and is the most beautiful I have observed in Europe including many structures dating back to the middle ages and the renaissance. It has been the center for Polish academic, cultural, and artistic life for a millennium. We walked into the main market square (Rynek Glowny) of Old Town in the middle of a protest in front of St. Mary's Basilica, which was the tallest building in Krakow for centuries (Fig 1).

Two protest groups separated by lines of police were facing off peacefully for and against illegal immigration. The main altar in the Basilica (Fig. 2) is decorated by a famous altarpiece created between 1477 and 1489 by Veit Stoss a leading German sculptor. We climbed to the top of the Basilica later in the week to take photos of the square and the surrounding city.

The building in the center of (Fig. 3) is called Cloth Hall and has been the center for the clothing trade in Poland since the renaissance. There is an outdoor restaurant on the 2nd floor and a gallery of Polish art on the 3rd floor.

Fig. 4 shows a line-up of horse-drawn carriages in the main square which is the main mode of transport in Old Town with limited taxi/ auto access. Another feature of the square is a giant sculptured head called Eros Bendato referencing the severed head of Eros, god of love and desire.

The sculpture is a magnet to every child in the square as shown in Fig. 5. In the background are the Cloth Hall and the very top of St. Mary's Basilica.

We went to lunch at a nearby restaurant with entertainment by Polish folk dancers. Two of the dancers posed for a picture (Fig. 6) showing their national folk dresses featuring a linen blouse with intricate white embroidery, a velvet bodice (corset) with floral embroidery, a floral-patterned skirt, and a white cotton apron.

Next, we visited Wawel Castle (Fig. 7) which is on a hill at the edge of Old Town near the river. This castle was the home of Krakow's rulers in the Middle Ages. As we walked by the castle toward our bus, we passed an artistic version of a legendary dragon (Fig. 8) called the Wawel Dragon that lived under the castle in the 13th century and was feeding on local cows. There is an elaborate tale about how a local shoe maker killed the Dragon and won the hand of the King's daughter.

We spent a day exploring and shooting in districts adjacent to Old Town. The first was the Jewish Quarter. We visited the Remuh Synagogue built in the 16th century. Adjacent to the Synagogue is a Jewish graveyard that is the oldest in Poland. While we walked around the cemetery, a group Jewish Rabbi, mostly young men in traditional Orthodox clothing and side curls (Fig 9), were walking around studying specific grave stones. I assume the older Rabbi in the photo was leading the study group.

Later in the day we left the Jewish Quarter by crossing the Bernatek Footbridge into the Podgórze district that contained the World War II Jewish Ghetto. The bridge is a very modern structure with acrobatic sculptures attached to the support cables of the bridge (Fig.10 & 11).

From the bridge, we walked to view a block sized art installation of Empty Chairs memorializing the lives lost during the Holocaust (Fig. 12). From the memorial, we hiked up a hill with a large mound elevating it to one of the high places in the city. The panoramic in Fig. 13 shows tops of structures in Old Town and the Jewish Quarter. On the far left is the Wawel castle and a third of the way from the left are the double towers of St. Mary's Basilica.

On the next day, we traveled to Auschwitz and toured many of the facilities in the concentration camp. It was clear that they have tried to keep the facilities in the original state to remind the world of the dehumanization and extermination of the European Jewish people as part of the Nazi plans to execute their Final Solution. Under the leadership of Hans Frank, they built Auschwitz I, Auschwitz II, Birkenau and Auschwitz-Monowitz near Krakow. There were many mural size photographs in the inmate housing documenting the arrivals, detention, starvation, and extermination of the Jewish men, women and children. The photo in Fig 14 shows train tracks leading to Birkenau's main building and a copy of a photo showing arrival of Jews at the facility before being parsed out for work or immediate extermination in the gas chambers. Above the photo in the background you can see the internment camp barracks.

The objective for the Jews assigned to work was to work them to death. Fig. 15 shows the actual shoes collected from those exterminated and Fig 16 shows the actual ovens used to cremate the dead bodies. Needless-to-say the day was a little traumatizing.

One of the most interesting sites photographed was the Wieliczka Salt Mine. The deposit of rock salt has been mined since the 13th century. The salt mine displays show the evolution of mining techniques in Europe from the 13th to 20th century. The mine has hundreds of meters of galleries with works of art, underground chapels and statues sculpted in the salt, projecting a fascinating picture of the past. Fig 17 shows the vertical layout of the stairs, descending passageways and larger rooms in the mine.

Fig 18 shows an example of a descending passageway to a lower chamber. The maximum depth of the mine is about 1000 feet.

Fig 19 depicts sculptured workers from the past mining the salt. The most spectacular part of the mine is the chapel of St. Kinga, the holy patron of the mine. Everything in the chapel is made of pure salt, including walls, floor, and sculptures.

Some of the sculptures and chapel are shown in Fig. 21. Fig, 22 shows the steep salt walls of the lowest chamber in the mine and the elevator to the surface.

After the salt mine tour, we traveled further away from Krakow into a rural farm area of Poland and hiked several miles to view the farms and decorative farm houses in the small village of Zalipie. One of the farm houses in the village is depicted in Fig 23 and the adjacent farm field protected by a scarecrow in Fig 24.

Stephen Evans' Report from PSA Photo Festival - September 24-27th

Stephen shares his experiences and photos from PSA's 85th annual Photo Festival held in Portland, OR

The main events of the festival are technical talks and workshops on the art and science of photography. Topics included: Photo Project Design and Story Telling, Beginners Guide to Capturing the Milky Way, Telling Stories to Inspire Change, Leveraging Lensbaby Lenses in Creative Projects, Automobile Light Painting, Fine Art Photographer's Work Flow, and Perfection in Lightroom Classic. In parallel to the workshops, there were studio style photoshoots with models using continuous light. This year's theme was the "Magic of Dance". They had 5 ballet dancers go through a variety of ballet moves. The camera settings were F/3.2, 1250/s and variable ISO. Examples are shown below.

The Photo Festival ran a major gallery show in parallel to the conference open from Sept. 23 to Sept. 26. The gallery show displayed winning photographs in all categories from the past year.









At the Photo Festival opening ceremonies and the final banquet, awards are presented for photographic achievements and services to PSA. I received an service award at the opening ceremony for my work as a member and chairman of the Progress Award Committee.

Each year, PSA recognizes and honors a person who has made a major contribution to the progress of photography with the PSA Progress Award. This is PSA's highest award. Examples of past winners include the inventors of DLP and the Integrated Circuit. The recipient does not have to be a PSA member. I worked hard over the last year to select a recipient and then publicize his achievements through two PSA Journal articles and by adding a summary of the recipient's impact on photography to the Photo Festival Program.

The 2025 recipient for the Progress Award was Craig Strong. Photojournalist-turned-inventor, Craig Strong co-founded Lensbaby, Inc. in 2003, launching a revolution in creative photography. Their first product, a flexible lens with a distinctive sweet spot of focus, challenged photographers with its steep learning curve but quickly captivated a global audience—many of whom were just beginning to explore digital photography. Craig gave a talk on the afternoon of the last day of the Photo Festival describing Lensbaby lens products and showed many photographs demonstrating the creative possibilities using these lenses



At the PSA Honors Banquet that evening Craig Strong was recognized as the recipient of the 2025 Progress Award by the PSA Board and I presented the plaque to him.



The Photographic Society of America 2026 Photo Festival will be in Las Vegas, Sept. 13–19. The Photo Festival provides an intense week of workshops, technical talks, and studio photoshoots with excellent models. Each year the studio experiences have been very different. For example this year we had ballet dancers, last year wind, ice and fire and the year before cowboys and cowgirls. Other topics have been special macro setups, pole dancers, and portraits. Most photo festival sites are in vacation destinations. You can join PSA organized photoshoots/tours or go out on-your- own. The tours start on the Sunday before the Photofestival.

Larry Petterborg: PSA Photo Festival in Portland, OR

When I first heard that the 2025 PSA Photo Festival was to be held in Portland, Oregon, I knew we would be attending. Way back in the 1960's, my maternal grandparents retired and bought a house in Cannon Beach. I have been visiting Oregon ever since. The grandparents are long gone but we still have family there and generally go up in December. When flying into PDX, I always book a window seat where I can see Mt. Hood as we descend into the Columbia Gorge to land. This time, there was disappointingly very little snow on the summit due to warm and dry conditions (which is great if one is just visiting the area for a short time).

The festival started on Sunday, Sept. 21st with meetings and various photo tours but we arrived Wednesday afternoon in time for the Opening Ceremony. That evening, the first featured speaker, Ryan Smith spoke about "The Artist's Vision". He urged attendees to "compose with intention" and to develop their own personal style. On Thursday I went to talks by Jeff Schewe (a legend in the world of digital negatives and printing), Tim Grey (a Lightroom Master), Brooks Jensen (longtime publisher of "Lens Work"), Gary Crabbe (worked for Galen Rowell before going out on his own), and Alyce Bender (who is leading photo tours at Caddo Lake the same time we will be there). Friday night, Adam Jones (a Canon Explorer of Light and the speaker at the largest meeting ever at the Dallas Camera Club (I think)). The speakers all presented and discussed their own work while talking about what motivates them to make the photographs that they do. They were all very entertaining and inspiring. "Reality Sucks! That is why Photoshop is so successful" (Jeff Schewe).

Friday morning, I attended a workshop photographing dancers presented by Jennifer Curry Wingrove. Ms. Curry was a professional dancer and then became a photographer (like our own John Johnson). We had four young women dancers as models. Two sets (one white and the other black with constant lighting) were utilized. Each model rotated between both backgrounds and managed several costume changes. Once I had my exposure dialed in, I could set my camera to high-speed burst and shoot away. It was a good experience, and I think it may well be repeated next year at the Las Vegas Photo Festival.



Roaming Mexico: Laura Wilson

on exhibit September 14, 2025 - January 11, 2026

For four decades, the wilds of the American West have served as a key source of inspiration for renowned Dallas-based documentary photographer Laura Wilson (b. 1939). Her images of the people living and working "out west" ("out" meaning removed from modern American life) on ranches, Native American reservations, rodeos, and rural high schools are intimate yet distant. Indeed, as ever, the West is populated with characters defined by their distance, by their landsapes and lifeways that stand in sharp contrast to the familiar claustrophobia of urban and suburban America. There is, likewise, a kind of otherworldiness to Wilson's West; it is a marginal (if nested place. Her images resdie "on the edge," to paraphrase the renowened historian of medieval art Michael Camille, and we imagine the person behind the lens herself straddling the boundary between outsider and insider in a foreign land.

Dallas Camera Club (DCC) was organized in 1934 by 52 printmakers meeting twice a month to improve their photographic skills. Color slides were added, presumably in the 1940s, and color print competitions were added in 1970. In 1998, images from digital files were first accepted into DCC competitions. In 2005, slides were combined with projected digital images to create the projected images category. Slides were eliminated in 2008. Club competitions are now focused on color prints, monochrome prints and digital projected images.

The objective of the club is "the mutual entertainment and education of its members in all forms of amateur photographic art." The DCC hosts contests and events including monthly competitions, field trips, workshops, programs of general interest, an awards banquet and an annual competition (the "Bird") between DCC and Fort Worth Camera Club members. The DCC emphasizes intra-club competition as a learning process. Importance is placed on helping the beginner or new member feel at ease, ask questions, learn and participate.




