Click - Hal Sommer - A Single Tulip

At the end of March, I visited to the Dallas Arboretum. It was the end of the Tulip season but still there was plenty to see. I was looking for something different having take more than my fair share of flower images.

Walking along the path I noticed a tall red tulip in a bed of pinks and reds. Being taller than the others, it stood out. I got down low and took the image. (1/200 sec. – f 8.0) I continued my walk and took more pictures along the way.

Once I got home, I downloaded my images but I was not impressed by any of my tulip images. My single red tulip picture was the exception; yet, it still lacked impact.

In Lightroom, I cropped the image tightly. I wanted to leave only the pink tulips and my tall red tulip. The slightly blurred background now looked much better once it was enlarged. Then using the Adjustment Brush, I brightened the head of the tulip and sharpened it a little. Also using the Adjustment Brush, I brightened the stem to its vivid green.

I have now used this image in club Competition which received a second place. It was also entered in the State Fair Creative Arts Photographic competition and placed well.

Without the few minor adjustments made in Lightroom this image would have only been another of my many ordinary snapshots that would have been discarded.







Q & A - Stopping Fast Action



How do I capture moving subject in a variety of lighting conditions?

The DSLR and mirrorless cameras in use today are splendid tools filled with settings that provide the capability to take photographs under a wide range of conditions. Sometimes the camera's features are buried deep within the camera's menu system, so deep that the user may never know that some features even exist and may not understand how to implement cleaver settings that improve the probability of recording images under difficult situations.

A perfect example are settings to use when there is a need to use high shutter speeds to freeze motion - such as capturing birds in flight.

Adjusting the control for shutter speed is a setting that anyone using a modern camera knows. The problem is that when the shutter speed is increased (made faster), the aperture must be opened up to get a well exposed image. In Shutter Speed Priority available on these cameras, the adjustment is made automatically. As the shutter

speed is increase the camera dutifully opens up the f stop until it reaches the limit that the lens in use allows. If it's an f 4.0 lens, then the camera to which the lens is attached cannot open the aperture any more. If the shutter speed is increase beyond the ability of the lens to open the f stop, then the image will be underexposed.

Shutter speed of 1/2000 of a second and ever faster are needed and used to If panning with a moving subject is refreeze the motion of a bird in flight, for example. But the f stop limitation can hinder the bird photographer from using higher and higher shutter speeds.

The solution is to increase the ISO. One way to do this most efficiently is to set the ISO to automatically adjust itself to a value that allows a high shutter speed/aperture combinations. If the photographer consults his or her camera's manual, there will be discov-

ered how to set the cameras ISO limits in both amount and shutter speed. With this feature engaged the photographer can fire away and expect that the high shutter speeds will result in higher ISO values to record a correct exposure.

One other consideration. Is the setting of the lens stabilization. Many lenses' stabilization feature is either on or off. quired, it is necessary to turn OFF stabilization. Some lenses have settings that will stabilize a lens when used with horizontal panning. If fortunate to use one of these lenses, then the stabilization should be left on.

Lastly, the use of software to reduce or eliminate noise induced by high ISO setting can make the use of a floating ISO an asset, not a burden.





Click - Frank Richards - Christmas Cactus

This bloom is from a Christmas Cactus that we have had for 20 or 30 years. It blooms like clockwork every winter. I purchased a light box a couple of years ago and have not used it all that much. This looked like a good candidate to experiment with. In addition, I recently bought a camera with built in focus stacking capability that I am trying to understand better. This image was shot as part of an experimental photo session working with these new gadgets. I had a variety of plant materials that I shot that day.

So, I cut off a good specimen flower and set it up in front of my light box. The front side was illuminated with light from a North facing window to bring out some of the surface detail. I was shooting with a 100mm macro lens. 21/2 stops of exposure compensation were needed to keep from blowing out the flower and 8 images were stacked to cover the depth of field to render the entire bloom in focus.

The 8 images were preprocessed in Lightroom and moved to Zerene Stacker for focus stacking. Preprocessing was just used to create a good balanced image. You must be careful with any preprocessing to make sure exactly the same edits are applied to all the images. I do not sharpen, transform, crop or do local edits to the image prior to focus stacking. The focus stacked image was then post processed in



Lightroom and Photoshop. Nothing heroic at this point, just trying to get a good quality image that I could print.

This was early December and I was thinking about Christmas presents for my wife. She has always liked this Christmas Cactus, so I thought she might like a print to hang on the to give it a try. It won a 2nd the Flowall. (We have a lot of art hanging

around the house, but none of my photos.) I also printed a sunflower close-up and framed both to be hung as a pair and wrapped them up as Christmas presents. She was pleased.

This type of image often does well at the Texas State Fair, so decided ra class.

Getting to Deep Ellum & Instructions

Parking, and General Advice Directions Deep Ellum is on the east side of downtown Dallas. Getting to downtown is pretty straight-forward. Getting into Deep Ellum once you're downtown is actually surprisingly tricky on a good day. These days there's a lot of construction around the area adding to the issue. Thank god for GPS directions. Quick and easy, just punch "Deep Ellum" into your smartphone and stay calm. If you're not familiar with driving

> around downtown you might consider taking DART rail or riding with someone that's familiar with the area.

When To Arrive

Show up as early as you want. Because Deep Ellum is on the east side of downtown the rising sun bathes the city in a beautiful warm glow. Even on overcast days the early morning light on Deep Ellum and downtown

Dallas is quite photogenic. **Sunrise on Saturday is at 7:17am.** If you get there early enough you may even catch some of the neon signs down here during the morning "blue hour."

Where to Park

There are lots of parking lots and even a brand-new parking garage on Commerce. That being said, your best bet is to just park along the street. The parking meters are free until 6pm at night and Deep Ellum is big enough that you



Lunch

also want to provide opportunities for folks to get out, see the scenes and to take some dang pictures! The lunch gatherings at DCC field trips are one of the best parts of the experience. The Middle (Blue Area)

This area is still the "heart" of Deep Ellum with a number of interesting businesses, murals and a few locations with roof-top decks. Grab a cold one and take in an elevated view. Of minor interest, my home and studio is in this area. • Terry Black's BBQ • Deep Ellum Art Co • Thunderbird Station • Sons of Herman Hall • Continental Gin Building

Expo Park (Green Area)

As you get to the east edge of Deep Ellum things turn slightly to the south and angle down towards Fair Park. Whether this is a part of Deep Ellum or not tends to depend on what side of Exposition Ave. you live on. Neighborhood politics aside, Expo park has a lot of the same charm as Deep Ellum proper. The Texas Fair opens this weekend and if plan to combine the two destinations then Expo Park is your gateway to the fair grounds. South Side of DE (Yellow Area) This part of Deep Ellum is a little more spread out but there are some very cool things to see for those willing to put in the distance. Mark Cuban owns a number of these buildings and if you're a Mavericks fan this is where you should be. Some of the most ambitious murals are also in this area.

Off The Beaten Path

(Brown Area) This area stretches the definition of what's actually "Deep El-

lum" but still has some areas that some may find interesting. Especially if you hope to score really well on the scavenger hunt! Bonus tip, If memory serves... There's a great view up a street in this area where you can see the Texas Star off in the distance. If you can catch it at the right time of day (night?) it's a really neat shot.

Dallas Farmers Market (Dark Purple Area)

This area has undergone a LOT of renovation and increased popularity in the last few years. If it's been a while since you've been to the market it's worth a visit. The East Quarter (Light Purple Area) This is a new area of development downtown centered around everyone's favorite "flatiron" building just to the west of Deep Ellum. It's largely still under development but there are a few things there worth a glance and it's a short walk west up Commerce from the main part of Deep Ellum


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Cell Phone Photography - Larry Petterborg



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
